### Pub Information - Sam Kenney (P.I.S.K.)

THE BLESSINGTON CARRIAGE - CHAPEL STREET This is a recently opened free house in Derby offering handpumped Ansells and electric pumped Marstons Bitter. The only report on the ale so far is that the Ansells was good while the Marstons left alot to be desired. It was felt that it was possibly affected by cleaning fluid. Hopefully this is just a teething problem Our member on the spot also reports that Double Diamond at 32p, Skol at 34p, and Lowenbrau at 48p are also available, but he could not afford to experiment with these brews.

There is no local significance in the name as it is only an extension of the Nottingham firm's coaching theme. In fact it would have been called the 'Crown and Cusion' if they had known about the dem--olished local nearby. The building is tastefully modernised, well furnished and well decorated. We are also told that the landlord does not want to encourage the young set', preferring to cultivate a balanced', respectable clientele. It is therefore not a good place for a couple of dozen CAMRA members to descend on the place en masse.

There is an excellent cold buffet in 'Betty's Bar' and full meals in the res--taurant at the rear. Obviously this is a very important gain for CAMRA.

### JOHN THOMPSON - INGLEBY

From June the 'John Thompson' will be selling their own brew according to one of our members. The beer will be called John Thompson Bitter but it is not yet known if it is going to be traditional draught ale.

### BARLEY MOW - KIRKIRETON

Samuel Smiths on gravity has been intro--duced and was sampled by many of our members on the recent Wirksworth trip. The brew did not taste quite right and it was reported that it had been taken off a couple of nights later. Hopefully this again was just a teething problem and soon that the handpumps were there to stay we should have three gravity ales at the Barley Mow.

### STANHOPE ARMS - STANTON BY DALE

The handpumps have been completely rem--oved and both mild and bitter are being served by diaphragm type electric pumps.

### WILLIAM CAXTON - SINFIN

A good pint of Everards old Original is offered in this new pub according to the majority of our members who have tried it. An official visit has been made and several fact must be noted. Firstly, the handpump is obviously a fake. Secondly, the beer is apparently ejected by electrically controlled air pressure onto a 'pancake' diaphragm, forcing the beer ( pint) into a meter fixed onto the wall. The whole system is enclosed and none of this machinery can be seen. We cannot be fully satisfied with this description by the landlord as it is too vague. It has been suggested that we ask the brewery through the Brewery Liason Officer.

RUTLAND ARMS - LOWER CARRINGTON ST. All of our members who have been in the Rutland Arms recently agree that the beer is now served under pressure, and an officialvisit would therefore be pointless, as the truth is painfully clear.

### ISAAK WALTON - DOVEDALE AREA Unconfirmed reports in the last issue

have now been confirmed by one of our members. That is that the Isaak Walton is now selling the real thing.

### MARKEATON HOTEL - KEDLESTON RD One of our members reports that this pub

went back to real ale on thurs 5th May. Hopefully some of our members will try the ale and confirm this report.

### KEDLESTON HOTEL - KEDLESTON (?)

Electric pumped Bass is now being served according to one report. Could we have confirmation of this.

### QUEENS HEAD - LITTLE EATON

The landlord has reverted to electric pumps for both bitter and mild after introducing handpumps as aresult of flood damage. It seemed at one time but the landlord is reported to have said that he was losing money by not serving measured pints.

At the time of going to press No.5 Mild should be on sale here. It seems that this has been promised before and hs never materialised but perhaps this time it will.

### THE KINGS HEAD - HILTON

The description in the local guide reads - 'Plush lounge to the fore but seek out handpumps in the back bar.' There are, however, handpumps in the lounge and the barmaid says they have been there all the time.

Inaccurate descriptions should be avoided at all costs and if anyone notices any they should reported at once.
