Following nine very successful years of the Derby Beer Festival, the local branch of CAMRA's latest venture is a beer festival in Alfreton, at the Leisure Centre on Church Street (see map, page 2). The date to note: Saturday December 6th.

The organisers plan to feature about 20 different beers, concentrating on famous names not locally available, such as Greene King Abbot Ale, Courage Directors' Bitter, Taylor's Landlord, Theakston Old Peculier, and famous Black Country beers like Ma Pardoe's and Holden's Special.

In addition there'll be some local beers which are not as widely available as they should be, like Four XXXX from Mansfield and John Smith's new draught bitter. Real draught cider will also be available.

There'll be live entertainment at both sessions: at lunchtime we have the contemporary folk sound of Culpepper, and it's umpah in the evening with the Wunderschon Schunkel Umpah Band.

Glass collectors should note that the special souvenir tankard is expected to be in great demand, since it's a small production run.

You'll be able to get something to eat to soak up the ale, and you can do your Christmas shopping for the 1987 Good Beer Guide and other items at the sales stall.

# **Footlights Fun and Games**

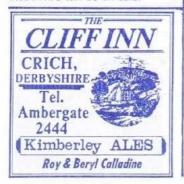

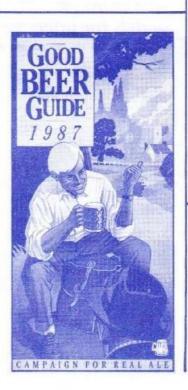
## BEST OF 57!

# Ind Coope Selling Spree (Pt 311½)

The future of yet another Ind Coope pub now looks extremely uncertain. The Wheatsheaf, a keg beer only pub in Wirksworth, which has been closed for some time, has now been put on the market for £65,000. It is understood that an as yet undisclosed supermarket chain may still be interested in acquiring the premises and converting it into a store. Also currently on the market is a free house, Derby's controversial 'Abbey' at Darley Abbey, which was recently refused planning permission for a beer garden. Offers are required of at least £195,000.

### **Pub Alterations**

Additional car parking space should soon be available at the Old Spa Inn, Abbey Street, Derby where planning permission has been applied for the demolition of outbuildings. Of greater concern is the application for internal alterations at the Seven Stars, King Street, Derby - it is to be hoped that this will not affect the character of one of Derbys oldest and more interesting pubs.

# Wards on the increase and more Booze Nooze

The outlets for Wards bitter are again on the increase in Derby. It is now available at Boaters restaurant on Friargate, where you can pop in and sample this Sheffield brew without having a restaurant meal, and it is also understood that the Babington tea rooms have applied for an on-licence with the intention of taking Wards.

Also the Dolphin Inn on Queen Street is now selling M & B mild on electric dispense and John Smiths bitter has replaced Mansfield Four XXXX at the Kestrel, Ripley. Whilst on the Bass front, the James Wyatt at Alvaston is no longer selling Draught Bass, but the New Flower Pot on King Street, Derby may be having it in future - watch this space for further developments.





# **Beer Guide** Launch Row

The new, 1987 GOOD BEER GUIDE published by CAMRA, has already stirred up quite a bit of controversy, even before its launch. Editor Neil Hanson chose as his target for his usual campaigning editorial the additives that brewers put into

Items such as head stabilisers and colouring, sulphur dioxide and lead, as well as a number of other things they don't tell you about, are to be found in many beers, claims Hanson. He is pressing for a list of ingredients to be displayed on beer containers. He cites the fact that many foreign countries ban the import of British beer, ostensibly because of the additives which are often used.

The Brewer's Society sees no cause for alarm, however, stating that things such as lead occur naturally in the ingredients used and are not put there by the brewing process. They also state that, as brewing changes the chemical nature of the ingredients, what would you put on such a list what went in or what came out?

Now that the OFT have, as expected, cleared Scottish and Newcastle's | 120m takeover of Home Ales, prices are expected to rise - according to a report entitled 'Save our Breweries' which was presented to the OFT by CAMRA in September.

CAMRA price surveys over number of years have consistently found Home to be one of the cheapest breweries in Britain and rents paid by Home tenants are widely regarded as being below the industry average. With Greenall Whitley owning Shipstones; Not-With Greenall tingham is viewed as being under the threat of a national brewers cartel.

Scottish and Newcastle's promised "retailing skills" would undoubtedly involve costly advertising another cost to be covered - and it is feared that the larger, high turnover Home pubs will become less of the traditional local and more of a "profit centre". Closure among the 100 Home houses selling less than five barrels a week are also feared.

# JUST SAY NO

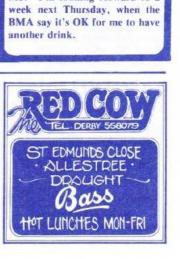

# **GONE FOR A BURTON**

Ind Coope Burton Brewery's estate of tenanted and managed pubs, set up as an experiment under the direct control of the brewery marketing department, to try to give a little individuality to a local cross-section of Allied Breweries hostelries, is to be transferred, to come under the management of the Ind Coope and Allsopps arm of the giant brewing combine.

Landlords of the pubs affected voiced their disapproval of the move at a meeting called by the brewery after the decision had been taken. They are worried at the prospect of being re-absorbed into what they see as the anonymity of Allied's tied estate.

Ind Coope Burton Brewery, with its motto, "Proud of being better", had achieved a remarkable reputation in its relatively short existence, most notably in the field of pub refurbishments. Its tasteful treatments of traditional inn decor culminated in the award of Best Pub Refurbishment in Britain to the Olde Spa Inne on Abbey Street, while the Brick and Tile has been put forward for this year's awards.

Area Manager, Bob Thorne, widely praised by CAMRA as the man behind these successes, has taken redundancy.

# Ferret Unmasked

All right, we admit it; Doris, the mild-drinking ferret of the last issue was a figment of our warped imagination. It had a few of you fooled, though, we even got a phone call from a certain local evening newspaper, wanting to know if they could take a picture of Doris and her supposed owner Tim Webb!

We have to come clean; we succumbed to the temptation of an in-joke. Tim Webb is an official of CAMRA National H.Q. who edits a publication called "Omnibus" which is a compilation of the best bits from CAMRA regional newsletters. The ferret joke was us having a dig at him over something he wrote in a recent issue. We are sorry. (Tee hee) No, really, we are.

Landlords feel they have been let down by the brewery over what had proved to be a most popular move, towards a smaller trading unit with its own identity. Many feel that with a little more publicity and possibly a beer sold exclusively through ICBB outlets there would have been a strong argument for retaining the separate identity.

They are not convinced by the brewery's assurances that the name Ind Coope Burton Brewery will continue to be developed as a pub brand by Ind Coope and Allsopp.

# ELDERS TAKE COURAGE

Elders IXL, the giant Australian brewing concern, finally bounced into the British brewing industry in September by buying Courage from Hanson Trust for £1.4 billion, just as we suggested they might in the last issue of Derby Drinker (swank, swank).

This means that the Elders bid for Allied-Lyons (Ind Coope to you) hapses and Elders' Fosters lager brand will probably become available in Courage pubs under a joint distribution arrangement with Watneys, who currently fill the tinnies with it under licence.

Let us hope that Mr John Elliot, Elders' ebullient chief executive, stands by his pledge, made to CAMRA's AGM this Spring, that he intends to develop the sale of traditional beers.

It's all good fun but that doesn't mean it's not taken seriously; team managers agonise over who to pick for which match, (John's good on sport and pop music but he's a dead loss on current affairs and literature...) heated exchanges are common over a disputed point or the not infrequent wrong answer on the question sheet and "needle" matches are prepared for like internationals.

So, if your pub is one of the 60 or so in the league, pop along on a Wednesday night and support them. As most teams operate a "pool" system of players, you may get a game from time to time. If your local is an Ind Coope pub, persuade your landlord to enter a team in the Ind Coope Knockout Trophy, starting after Christmas. This culminates in a grand final at the brewery in the Spring.

Who knows - your pub could contain the next Boozebrain of Britain!

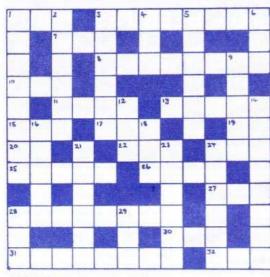

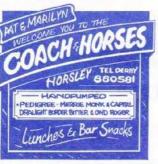
