The 22nd Derby Beer Festival (July 7th - 11th) will celebrate 200 years since the birth of Michael Thomas Bass who, apart from being Derby's longest serving MP (35 years) and part of the brewing family was a most generous benefactor to Derby.

He gave us the Free Library and Museum in the Wardwick, two open-air swimming baths and the recently controversial Bass's Rec amongst other things.

His statue (pictured above) stands in Museum Square outside the present day library in the Wardwick.

Quality Counts!

Derby CAMRA - the Campaign for Real Ale - are calling on cellar staff to raise their quality standards in time for the new millennium. And they will be offering promotional support to pubs where serving a good pint is taken seriously.

Pubs who are prepared to give a "no quibble" undertaking to change a poor pint or top up a less than 100 per cent measure are to be offered posters to advertise that they offer a "HAPPY PINT". Local licensees will also be invited to a series of meetings with Derby CAMRA to discuss quality issues.

A survey of 80 beers in Derby in October found only 4 in superb condition. Thankfully only 3 were almost undrinkable. The quality of beer in Derby is at least average or slightly better. The school report would say "B minus, good, but with a little more effort could be outstanding."

CAMRA's National AGM will be held at the Assembly Rooms in Derby in April 2000. Around 1000 of the most dedicated and discerning members from all over the UK will descend on Derby for a weekend of talking about and drinking real ale. Derby CAMRA, as hosts, would like those people to go home raving about the quality and choice available in Derby.

Ivor Clissold Award

Meanwhile, three pubs have been nominated to be surveyed by Derby CAMRA members to see if they qualify for an "Ivor Clissold Quality Award". Under the spotlight will be all aspects of quality and service - not just the beer. If successful they will receive the highest award Derby CAMRA can make.

Marstons & Banks's - the takeover fight gets ugly

Two midlands independent brewers are locked in a bitter battle which is unlikely to be resolved by the time you read this

Wolverhampton & Dudley (Banks's) have upped their bid for Marstons and promise 200 jobs will go in Burton if they win. Marstons' counter bid aims at closing W&D's breweries in Wolverhampton and Hartlepool (Camerons - owned by W&D) and getting Bass to brew

Banks's and Camerons' beers at their Cape Hill Brewery in Birmingham. They would also sell 1,150 pub tenancies but keep the historic Burton Brewery - despite revelations that they approached S&N and Whitbread last year offering to sell it.

The only happy outcome will be a failure of both bids - or the Monopolies and Mergers Commission putting a stop to the whole shooting match. Enjoy the finest range of QUALITY cask conditioned beers at the award winning

Enter the Dragon

About six miles south-west of Derby and even closer to Burtonupon-Trent lies the village of Willington, in the shadow of the power station and the recent A50 realignment. Nestling in its heart is a gem of a pub which deservedly qualified for inclusion in the 1999 National Good Beer Guide only for editorial errors being responsible for its omission in the text.

The Green Dragon stands set back from the A5132 road and is backed by the Trent & Mersey Canal, where brightly-painted barges with names such as Whistling Swan and Peggotty Jar lap contentedly in the cut. At its front is a beer garden and car-park facing the reopened Willington railway station, on the Derby -Birmingham line, which has a

Pubs that remain in the same family for years and continuity of face behind the bar is becoming increasingly rare and it is both unusual and refreshing in these days of short-term occupation to report that the pub has been run for upwards of twenty years now by the licensee, Bill Grenville. During this time the Green Dragon has become a haven for

well-kept ales and very good value lunch and evening food. Marstons Pedigree, Tetley bitter, Morland Old Speckled Hen and Wadworth 6X are regular features but some more imaginative selections do appear and the likes of Brains SA and Fullers ESB have been recently available. The Dragon is also one of a dwindling number of venues to regularly keep the excellent Ind Coope Draught Burton Ale in the area and boasts genuine membership of the Guild Of Master Cellarmen.

The white painted pub has a drinking area akin to a bar to the right on entry with the left-hand side largely given over to food and including a no-smoking area. There are large collections of brassware and cigarette cards. The pub has intimate low beamed ceilings and is adorned with prints and drawings of the Burton brewing industry including the Union Systems, perhaps to become merely a distant memory for future generations?

New Chairman

The Derby based Heritage Pub Company have appointed ex-Mansfield brewery property director Hugh Wilson as their new chairman. Heritage run 35 pubs and hope to expand to 70 in the next 18 months.

Burton Gloomy

Burton upon Trent, already reeling from the Marstons takeover battle has been hit by further bad news. Bass are to axe 200 office jobs following their purchase of the Carlsberg-Tetley brewery last year. On top of that Allied Domecq announced a decline in sales over the Christmas period which sent their shares tumbling. Then it was announced that the Burton Festival would be scrapped unless £30,000 could be found. Thankfully the Burton CAMRA Beer Festival will not be affected and Burton Bridge Brewery is thriving. No wonder Burton Albion are not performing well.

With bar staff, chefs, taxi drivers, entertainers and babysitters all charging a small fortune for their services on New Year's Eve the millennium celebrations are heading for a chaotic washout. Pubs and other venues are undecided about opening and charges leaving potential revellers in the dark about where to go and how much it will all cost.

Already the City Council have scrapped plans for a Market Place party and JD Wetherspoons have announced that their pubs, the Standing Order and Babington Arms in Derby and the Red Lion, Heanor will shut at 8.30pm. The Fat Cat in Derby will close whilst the Rhode Island Exchange will kick diners out at 10.30pm.

You can find somewhere to celebrate if you want to pay a fortune well in advance. There will be a party at Pride Park Stadium and nightclubs Time and the Pink Coconut will be hosting their parties. Morley Hayes will be open and for £390 per person you can have an all-inclusive two night break at the Makeney Hall Hotel.

One pub planning a 'normal' New Year's Eve is the Green Man at Willington although unless others follow suit it is likely to be anything but 'normal'. Unless pubs firm up their plans and publicise them many will opt for private parties at home and watching TV - a millennium damp squib.

Government plans to allow all night opening every New Year's Eve will be a waste of time if there's nowhere left open at midnight.
