FALSTAFF SET TO BREW

As we go to press City Planners are expected to approve plans for the Falstaff, Silverhill Road, Derby (pictured below) to expand into a neighbouring house and a former tailoring workshop. The house is set to be part of the extended pub whilst the workshop will be converted to a microbrewery. The Derby Branch of CAMRA, the Campaign for Real Ale, has fully supported the planning application by Parkes (Derby) Ltd. owned by Peter and Adrian Parkes who took over the Victorian pub three years ago.

In a letter to the City Council's planning committee Pub Preservation Officer Julian Tubbs wrote "From the consumer's point of view each new micro brewery producing beer of good quality is hugely welcome, without representing a serious threat to the viability of other micro brewers".

We told you so...

As predicted in the last issue of Derby Drinker Bass have increased their wholesale prices by 2.9 per cent and Wolverhampton and Dudley Brewery - new owners of Marstons - have pushed up the price of beers in their managed house by 5 pence per pint. "The Falstaff has justified its place in CAMRA's 1999 Good Beer Guide as a retailer of excellent quality in a part of Derby where real ale has been difficult to find. It is already a house which the discerning drinker seeks out and the local community is catered for hospitably. We believe that the extra facilities provided by the extension will be of mutual benefit to the local community and outside visitors alike."

Adrian Parkes hopes that Derby's third brewery - the Brunswick and the Flamingo and Firkin are the other two - will be brewing a different beer every day of the week by September. The beers are expected to be in line with the Falstaff's guest beer policy - nothing weaker than 4.5% ABV - and with the first brew will come the realisation of a dream for the Parkes' father and son team.

"It's always been an ambition and I'm sure we can do it well and attract more people. It's a little bit about preserving our heritage" enthused Adrian.

We'll drink to that - see you in September.

Hobgoblin replaces Heroes

First Leisure have scrapped plans to turn the Mechanic's Institute in the Wardwick, Derby into a Heroes Sports and Diner. Instead the Wychwood Brewery, based in Witney, Oxfordshire, have stepped in and signed a deal to transform the building into one of its Hobgoblin chain of pubs with a planned opening before Christmas. Some features of the original building, including the high ceiling, will be restored.

Dead Poets Inn is Pub of the Year

Just a year after its transformation and re-opening the Dead Poets Inn at Holbrook (formerly the Cross Keys) has been named as Derby CAMRA's Pub of the Year.

It now goes forward to the regional stage of the national competition to find Britain's Pub of the Year.

Owner Dave Brown (pictured left) spent £30,000 on transforming the pub by exposing old beams, stone walls and fireplace and laying a flagstone floor. Seven real ales are on sale including Dead Poets Ale and If - brewed for the pub by the Brunswick brewery. There's no juke box, pool table or fruit

machines but there is entertainment in the form of poetry readings and live folk music sometimes in the form of impromptu, local-led, sing-alongs. The pub recently celebrated its first anniversary by holding a beer festival.

The award is not just for the quality of the beer - the warm welcome, good service, pleasant surroundings and lively, friendly atmosphere of this community pub were all taken into account when Derby CAMRA members cast their votes recently.

New Derby Pub Guide nears completion

The 1999 edition of Real Ale in Derby is due to be published in July and should be available at the Derby Beer Festival.

Shipstones death sentence

Carlsberg Tetley, who sold their Burton Brewery to Bass in 1997 and entered into a three-year deal for Bass to brew their beers have started pulling the plug on some famous names of brewing.

From 20th August ABC Bitter, Shipstones Bitter and Shipstones Mild will no longer be supplied.

Bonnie Prince Opens

Kimberley brewer Hardys and Hansons have opened their new £2 million pub on Swarkestone Road. Derby Beer Festival aims high

Can it get better? The Derby CAMRA Beer Festival is not only the fourth largest in Britain but has a growing reputation as being one of the best - for quality, atmosphere, entertainment and presentation. Derby CAMRA members have been working behind the scenes to ensure that the 22nd Derby Beer Festival at Derby's Assembly Rooms from July 7th to 11th is the best yet.

Once again there will be over 100 beers plus cider and perry. As is usual there'll be three beers brewed especially for the Festival, a selection of Belgian and German beers and a plethora of new and guest beers. But, for the first time there will be a Belgian bottled beers stall at the Darwin Foyer bar to bring drinkers an even wider selection.

The entertainment gets better and better with a large enough range to appeal to almost everyone - from pop to folk to blues, jazz, celtic, country, tributes and a disco! All at prices to match any live entertainment venue locally.

And the cheese stall is back. After many years the Assembly Rooms caterers have relented and agreed to provide the cheese stall that festival-goers have been demanding for many years now. They will also be adding a German sausage stall. Drinkers will notice other changes: the glass stall, for instance, will now be in the cloakroom area half way up the main stairs instead of at the top of the stairs in the foyer.

This year the new beers bar has been moved to the Darwin Room and re-named as "Guest Beers". There will be plenty of new beers to sample but also some not-sonew rare or distinctive beers. The Derbyshire Ales have been moved to the Great Hall. The Guest Beer list will not be finalised until shortly before the festival but the main brewers are now decided. There will be three 'Festival Ales' especially brewed for the festival with the assistance of CAMRA members:

Why do CAMRA do it?

To preserve traditional beers. In 1971 the Campaign for Real Ale was formed to stem the tide of fizzy keg beer threatening to engulf our pubs. The huge variety of styles and beers now available to delight drinker's taste buds is testament to their success. And it is events like the Derby Beer Festival which showcase that variety.

CAMRA; 50,000 plus strong and growing, not only organise beer

festivals. Their 171 branches publish local pub guides, magazines such as Derby Drinker and web sites. They pick pubs to include in the best selling Good Beer Guide and organise campaigns on specific issues such as beer duty and competition as well as enjoying socials,

brewery trips and pub crawls. Being a CAMRA member is fun!

Real Ale is beer which is still living; it has not been pasteurised at the brewery and is served without SEUM needing the aid of artificial carbon dioxide pressure. There are now more than 1,000 different beers from an ever increasing number of small brewers. Derby itself is set (Planning Committee willing) for a new brewery at the Falstaff. Silverhill Road, Derby.

There are still threats to that choice: brewery takeovers invariably lead to reduced choice and, where once there were the "Big Six" brewers monopolising the industry there are now the "Big Ten" pub chains who threaten to create monopolies of low choice and indistinct quality. This is why CAMRA still needs more members to join the fight for quality and choice.

Derbyshire beers

Brunswick, Derby. Brewing began in 1991 four years after the world's first purpose-built railwayman's hotel was saved by a restoration project.

Cellarman's Choice 4% ABV, Mine Host 4.5% ABV, Brewer's Tipple 5.2% ABV - all three are new beers available at the festival before anywhere else.

Leatherbritches, Fenny Bentley. Bill Allingham started brewing behind the Bentley Brook Hotel in 1994. The also do a range of tasty beer sausages.

Goldings 3.6% ABV, Taking the Pith 4.3% ABV a wheat beer, Bespoke 5.0% ABV rich, fruity, full bodied

Shardlow Brewery. Being just over the Trent the brewery is, strictly speaking, in Leicestershire being housed in the old kiln house of the original Cavendish Bridge Brewery which closed in the 1920's. Started brewing in 1993.

Chancellor's Revenge 3.6% ABV, Reverend Eatons 4.5% ABV, Whistle Stop 5.0% ABV

Whim, Hartington. Giles Lichfield began brewing in redundant outbuildings on his farm in 1993. Now also owns the Broughton brewery in Cumbria.

Magic Mushroom Mild 3.8% ABV well balanced mild, Hartington IPA 4.0% ABV, Snow White 4.5% ABV a Bavarian style wheat beer

From the rest of the country come:

Brains, Cardiff. A traditional family brewery since 1882. Supplies award winning beers to all their 125 pubs.

Dark 3.5% ABV a bittersweet mild, Bitter 3.7% ABV hoppy, distinctive bitter, S.A. Best Bitter 4.2% ABV full-bodied, well-balanced and smooth.

Bullmastiff, Cardiff. The newer Cardiff brewery having started life in nearby Penarth in 1987.

Jack the Lad 4.1% ABV, Summermoult 4.3% ABV, Brindle 5.0% ABV

Caledonian, Edinburgh. Superb beers brewed in "a living, working museum of beer making"; a Victorian brewhouse using the last three direct-fired open coppers in Britain.

Deuchars IPA 3.8% ABV, refreshing, hoppy bitter, 80/- 4.1% ABV malty and well-balanced, Golden Promise 5.0% ABV hoppy organic beer

Church End, Shustoke, Warwickshire. Founded in 1994 in an old coffin workshop which explains some of the beer names. This innovative brewery is not afraid to experiment with a variety of ingredients.

Hop Gun 4.1% ABV, Shreddies 4.5% ABV, Fallen Angel 5.0% ABV

Crouch Vale, South Woodham Ferrers, Essex. Since founding in 1981 they have steadily built up a growing trade with up to 300 outlets.

Millennium Gold 4.2% ABV, Golden Duck 3.8% ABV summer beer, Strong Anglian Special 4.8% ABV well-balanced and sharply bitter.

Freeminer, Coleford, Gloucestershire. Established at the edge of the Forest of Dean in 1992 the brewery also produces cider and perry and a range of bottle conditioned beers.

Slaughter Porter 5.0% ABV a dark ale akin to a strong mild, Shakemantle Ginger Beer 5.0% ABV a cloudy summer beer with a high wheat content, Deep Shaft Stout 6.2% ABV the malt hits you to be followed by dry hoppiness.

English, Scottish, Welsh, Belgian, German, bottled, bitter, mild, porter, stout, summer, barley wine, dark, light, hoppy, malty, fruit, herbs, ginger, smoked, pilsner, strong, quaffable, cider, perry - and all under one roof - read on...

Hanby, Wem, Shropshire. Set up by former Wem Brewery head brewer, Jack Hanby after Greenalls closed the brewery in 1988. Supplies 100 free trade outlets.

Black Magic Mild 3.3% ABV dark and malty, Independence 4.5% ABV, Nutcracker Bitter 6.0% ABV smooth: more bitter than sweet.

Mauldons, Sudbury, Suffolk.
Company set up in 1982 by
former Watney's brewer Peter
Maulden whose family had its
own local brewery in the late 18th
century.

Midsummer Gold 4.0% ABV a summer beer, Suffolk Pride 4.8% ABV, Black Adder 5.3% ABV a dark stout with a strong malt taste. Champion Beer of Britain in 1991.

Museum Brewing Company, Burton upon Trent. Active brewery in Bass's museum which uses recipes from the Bass archives.

Joules, Hop Pit 18th 4.5% ABV, Draught Bass 4.4% ABV a classic beer hopefully in classic condition at the festival. Brewed at Bass not the Museum Brewery.

Nethergate, Clare, Suffolk. Award winning beers are traditionally brewed with no artificial additives although many have herbs and spices added.

Swallow Ale 4.3% ABV, Augustinian Ale 4.8% ABV, Umbel Magna 5.0% ABV a smooth and distinctive dark porter infused with coriander and brewed to a recipe from the 1750's.

Ridleys, Chelmsford, Essex.

Brewery in picturesque setting founded in 1842 and still in the same family. Now with 62 pubs in Essex and 120 free trade outlets.

Wish You Were Here 3.8% ABV, Witchfinder Porter 4.3% ABV a bittersweet malty porter, Spectacular 4.6% ABV pale, malty and bitter.

Woodfordes, Woodbastwick, Norwich. Started in Norwich in1980 and moved to the

Woods, Craven Arms, Shropshire. Founded by the Wood family in 1980 in buildings adjacent to the Plough Inn.

Production began in 1985 and
now supplies 150 free trade
outlets and three tied

German and Belgian Beers

From Germany we have; Aecht Schlenkerla Rauchbier (4.6% ABV) - smoking the barley over beechwood gives this a strange smoked flavour; St. Georgen Brau Pilsner (4.8% ABV) - a pilsner lager; Staffelberg Brau Weissbier (5.2% ABV) - a wheat beer; Reissdorf Kolsch (4.9% ABV) - a different type of lager but not a pilsner; Augustiner Mai Bock (7.0% ABV) - a celebratory strong beer brewed each May - be careful; Raitenhaslacher Kloster Kellerbier (5.2% ABV - similar to the Kolsch.

And from Belgium we have our usual fruit beers: Leifmans Kreik (6.5% ABV) - made with cherries and Leifmans Framboise (4.5% ABV) made with raspberries.

Guest Beers

Around 22 new and "guest" beers will be available in the Darwin Bar - that should keep the 'tickers' happy. But take note: not all beers will be available at every session - we have to ration them to make sure we are left with more than 2 beers by Friday night!

WHITBREAD THREAT TO GUEST BEERS

CAMRA faces its biggest battle for years as it prepares to fight tooth and nail against Whitbread's proposals to buy Allied Domecq's pub estate. Success for Whitbread would make them Britain's biggest chain with more than 7,000 pubs. To comply with the Beer Orders they would almost certainly have to sell their breweries. This would entitle them to throw out the rights of Whitbread Pub Partnership tenants and Vanguard lessees to take a guest beer from wherever they like.

At an emergency meeting of CAMRA's National Executive chairman Dave Goodwin called it "the biggest single threat to micro brewers we've seen."

"The guest beer market is a vital life-line for many of them. It's their only way into the pub market and many of them could go out of business if Whitbread refused to take guest beers." With their massive buying power they would also be able to buy only from suppliers who offered huge discounts thus squeezing further micro and regional brewers who don't have the financial muscle to meet these demands

CAMRA is seeking an urgent meeting with the Office of Fair Trading to express concerns about the deal and to see what action can be taken to save guest beers. They also plan to appoint experienced members to liaise with the major pub chains.

"Ten years ago the Monopolies and Mergers Commission report said there was a complex monopoly acting against consumer's interests," he pointed out. "Today it's a few pub chains that dominate and dictate to brewers what beers they will brew and at what prices. We need more powerful liaison with the pub chains and we need talented people to negotiate with them."

There are also concerns for the future of Whitbread's only remaining real ale brewery; Boddington's Strangeways Brewery in Manchester. "Boddingtons may be a national brand stripped of its flavour but it has the potential to be a brilliant beer again and we don't want it to close," said Dave Goodwin.
