to brighten up your winter with its biggest and best line-up of beers and bands.....Ever!!

Back for a seventh great year, CAMRA's first major Beer Festival of 2008 will run from Thursday evening 3rd January until Saturday 5th January again in the Darwin Suite of the Assembly Rooms on Derby Market Place.

It will showcase over 90 beers from all over the country and abroad. These will include every style imaginable from Bitter & Lager to Mild, Porter & Stout to Cider & Perry to Continental Bottled Beers. We have also commissioned a unique Festival Ale; 'Malvolio' to commemorate the spirit of Shakespeare's 'Twelfth Night' brewed specially for the occasion by the

Brunswick Brewing Company.

And as usual we will have an exceptional line-up of entertainment that should appeal to all tastes and age groups including the return of Alan Woolley with his new band, the Dirty Rotten Scoundrels and three top tribute bands, Buck Rogers tereotonics and the UK Foo

(Feeder), Stereotonics and the UK Foo Fighters.

The whole thing will get under way at 6pm on the Thursday evening and run right through to 11pm on the Saturday night. But remember to come early, as it does get extremely busy in the evenings. Or you could avoid all that queuing by getting your ticket in advance for Friday/Saturday evening from the Flowerpot pub in Derby or the Derby CAMRA website.

All in all then it promises to be a great Festival with something for everyone. So why not blow away those post festive/back to







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Microbrewery Corner

Taking a look at what's happening at the independent breweries in and around Derby



AMBER ALES

Fresh on the heels of their SIBA Midlands competition successes (see below), Amber have just taken on new premises to accommodate brewery expansion at Asher Lane Business Park, Hammersmith. They will be selling from the brewery door, off sales as from in time for

Christmas. Beer will be available in bottle or polypin (free local delivery) or bring your own container.

Three new beers are the Colonial IPA (5.1%) based on the Derby Charter Ale but not quite so strong,

Barnes Wallis Bitter 4.1% in honour of the anniversary of one of Ripley's finest and the welcome return of the popular Winter Ruby 5.1%. See www.amberales.co.uk They are planning a special range of bottled beers for the New Year, including a Saison and a Belgian style Dubbel. Regular outlets: Nags Head, Ripley;

Hope & Anchor, Wirksworth, The Gate, Lower Hartsay; The Hay, Shirland; Flowerpot and Rowditch, Derby.

BOTTLE BROOK

Zeus at 4% was produced for the Smithfield beer festival in September. A stronger version of

> this beer has now been brewed and is on sale at the Old Oak, Horsley Woodhouse at a strength of 4.9%

BURTON BRIDGE

The latest Gold Medal Ale is Barrier Boy, a 4.5% pale, commemorating comedian Tony Hancock.

DERBY

There is never a dull moment at the Trevor Harris brewing stable. Four seasonal beers are available, two are old favourites - White Christmas, a 5.5% pale and Christmas Porter at 5%. This year they are joined by Merry Mash, a 4.2% traditional beer coloured ale and Great Expectations, another pale, this time 4%. Trevor is getting into the spirit with appropriate pumpclips!

DERVENTIO

In September the Trusley brewers obtained a Premises License. They can now sell their beer directly to the

Bass, Pedigree, Jennings plus guest beers. Real cider. 01283 702377 public from the brewery and also offer Brewery Tours (maximum 40 people). Derventio beers are now available in bottles. A new draught ale is Winter Solstice, a 5% brew. In the new year they intend to brew a new beer each month besides their current range

HEADLESS

First Bloom has now been joined on the bar by King Street Ale (KSA) 3.8% ABV a pleasant golden quaffing ale made from Lager Malt and Cascade hops. The name refers to the street the pub stands on and the KSA abbreviation to the owner, John Evans time spent in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

A Christmas beer has also been brewed and is maturing nicely in time for its December launch. Ebenezer 5.5% ABV is a golden coloured beer made with maris otter and will have the kick of a typical Christmas beer.

A one off beer FAB (Fat Al's Bitter) has also been on sale at the pub, which was down to a brew of First Bloom not turning out quite as it should be.

The Brewery also recently undertook its first official tour when members of CAMRA's National Executive Committee and Regional Directors where shown around. Further tours should be available in the New Year by prior arrangement.

JOHN THOMPSON

The JT Porter has appeared on the bar at the inn for its welcome seasonal return.

LEADMILL

In October Down Under 4% was at the Nottingham Beer Festival and Winter Hop 4.2% was at the Duffield Squash & Tennis Club Beer Festival. November saw the introduction of a 3.9% session beer, Pacific Gem and also a strong stout for Christmas, Russian Imperial Stout at 8.0%.

LEATHERBRITCHES

The brewery is still in process of relocation to Ashbourne. At present brewing is taking place at Normanton's Falstaff Brewery, not Parish as stated in *DD 118*.

A greater success for Derby Brewery came as Double Mash took the Gold Medal in the Specially Class. A famous away win in Nottingham for Derby!

In the Premium Bitter section Thornbridge Kipling took Bronze whilst Whim also swept the field in the Strong Bitter category with a gold for Flower Power. Amber Ales took the Silver with

Wirksworth Brewery joined the ever-burgeoning list of newcomers to the fray of brewing in Derbyshire in October. Based on John Street in the old lead

Just across the road at the Hope & Anchor, Market Place, Wirksworth launched the beer officially on 17th November -First Brew, a 4.2% ABV very quaffable bitter, from the Hope & Anchor. The brewer is local man Jeff Green. There are no more brews planned at present, Jeff wants to establish the initial brew more firmly first. It will be available at the Derby

Winter festival.

The brewery logo by Drilldown Design, represents the eWirksworth Cruck.

It is a one man band operation and he has been very, very surprised at the interest shown. As no more beers are in plan immediately, he just wants the locals to appreciate what a good beer it is and have beer "what it should taste like".

PUB NIPS

The Thorn Tree at Waingroves reopened after a period being boarded up. The adjacent Jolly Colliers however is now similarly stricken. The Steampacket at Swanwick has lost its next tenant, that's two since Steve Marshall left, which all goes to show that a good pub needs a good licensee who can negotiate with the pubcos. As for Mr Marshall, he has turned up at the Nags Head, Ripley and is running the pub as Nigel Eadie takes a continuing back seat. It is in good hands. The new Westfield Centre in Derby does not provide a pub by way of refreshment but one can visit the new, larger Red Zebra bottled beer shop. Licensee Paul Burlinson has left the Old Gate at Brassington after 19 years. The Miners Arms in the same village is also up for lease. The Nags Head in Hulland Ward had new tenants in October. The Liversage in Derby has reopened with the additional signage A.J's Bar.




Perry is proud that he is one of few (if not the only) city pubs

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Cider with Suzie

CAMRA's National cider and perry trip takes place each October, and this year we visited Devon. First stop, about 10 miles west of Exeter in gorgeous, unspoilt countryside was Brimblecombe's

Farmhouse Ciders, at
Farrant's farm, near
Dunsford. Cider
is made in a
barn dating
from the 14th
century, and the
huge, twin
screw press
which dominates
the interior of the
barn is over 400 years old.

The cider is pressed through straw, an ancient method about which I have heard much but had never seen in action. This was soon to be put right, as pressing was about to begin. A pile of barley straw and apple pulp was taking shape in a square tray under the press, and as I watched scoops of apple pulp and sheaves of straw were added until the resultant pile was about 5 feet high, and at least that wide and deep. The screw plate was wound down and soon a stream of pretty cloudy juice was passing through a hole in the wall into the back room and straight into oak vats. Pressing here is a leisurely process, as soon as resistance builds up the apple / straw stack was allowed to settle, the long poles attached to the screws allowed another turn of the press. Those who wanted to had a

However, it made a fine accompaniment to pressing at a cider farm where time has stood still for centuries.

Next up was a

Next up was a lunch stop at Ye Olde Cider Bar in Newton Abbot. This is one of a handful of cider bars in the country

where no beer is served, although they do have a wide range of country wines. The Wiscombe Suicider went down very well with a locally made pasty, all in all it is a bar well worth searching out. The final stop was at Green Valley Cyder, at Clyst St. George, just outside Exeter. At first sight it looks very unpromising, more like a retail outfit than a cider maker, but round the back we found a substantial cider making operation in full swing, all be it using rather more modern equipment than Brimblecombe! We were treated to sandwiches and a range of Green Valley ciders, including Rum Tiddlytum, a cider fermented in rum casks, and very rummy it was too. Back in Exeter there was a final treat for those with sufficient stamina. The Imperial, a very impressive Wetherspoons pub, was holding a cider festival with over 50 ciders and perries on sale, better than the cider bar at some beer festivals. The Old Monty from Montgomeryshire was especially memorable.

It's a fair way to Exeter, but you don't have to travel that far to sample some excellent ciders and perries. The Derby Twelfth Night Festival will be held in The Assembly Rooms from the 3rd to 5th January 2008. The cider bar will be in the fover at the top of the stairs, so why not start the New Year as you mean to go on and sup a few choice drinks there. As well as some local cider plus ciders and perries from Herefordshire and Somerset, we hope to have the three Devon ciders mentioned earlier, namely Brimblecombe Sweet?. Wiscombe Suicider and Green Valley Run Tiddlytum.



LocAle Launch

Erewash CAMRA is launching LocAle at the Observatory (pictured) on Ilkeston's Lower Market Place at 830pm, Tuesday, 11th December. LocAle, backed by Transport 2000, the national environmental transport campaign, promotes pubs that permanently stock well kept real ale that is brewed within 20 road miles of the participating pub.

It seemed appropriate that the Observatory should initiate LocAle because the Wetherspoon house always serves Funfair beer brewed in the town. The pub is in the first tranche of eleven eligible Erewash pubs in the innovative LocAle scheme that seeks to support the local economy, whilst simultaneously reducing food miles and our carbon footprint. The Observatory has at least one Funfair beer in its range of cask ales, and their tasty brews have proved very popular with customers.

The burgeoning craft brewing industry, which has blossomed in recent years, has spawned 21 breweries within 20 miles of eligible Erewash pubs. The accredited outlets will receive full details of all of these breweries, together with dedicated point of sale material. The move towards locally sourced produce, with its attendant benefits to the local economy and environment, is rapidly gathering momentum. Indeed, last

month's Cross Keys, Belper Beer Festival exclusively featured a roster of Derbyshire brewed ales, including no fewer than five from the Funfair stable.

the characters of Shakespeare's, Twelfth Night play.

Malvolio was the steward, or head servant, of the house of Lady Olivia, Sir Toby's niece.

It was he who berated Sir Toby and his pot companions for 'gribbling like tinkers' in the early



End of the hunt for Michael Jackson

The world of beer and beer writing lost a giant figure at the end of August. When Michael Jackson died, over thirty years of his research, exploring and writing about beers from all over the world came to an end. There are pages of accolades to him on internet sites from other writers and prominent figures in the industry. Roger Protz said: 'He was the best and always will be the best'. Jaclyn Bateman writes of the enjoyment and humour he brought with him to the brewery when filming The Beer Hunter.

His writing output was extraordinary, starting drinkers thinking and talking seriously about beer just as wine buffs had done for years. His World Guide To Beer (1977), sold millions and many other books followed over the years Michael Jackson's Beer Companion (1998), the 9th edition of The Pocket Beer Book (2000) and The Great Beers Of Belgium (5th edition 2006) are but a few of the range. The books have been translated into around 20 languages. He also wrote regularly for The Independent, The Observer, and The Washington Post and a host of food and drink magazines. It was however his award-winning Channel 4 TV programme, The Beer Hunter (1990) that brought him a wider

audience. It has been shown in 15 countries. Michael was also the first chairman of The British Guild of Beer Writers and received many awards, including one from Crown Prince Philippe of Belgium in 1994.

I met him twice recently at BGBW events but I did not really appreciate the range and output of the man. His influence spreads all over the world. He has been responsible for bringing little-known styles of Czech and German beers to light and inspiring the growth of small craft brewers in the USA. His legacy for us is a much expanded knowledge of beer styles here and abroad and indeed a much better access to unusual foreign beers. We also now have an adequate language with which to discuss our favourite drink. Thank you Michael for all this. Whenever a beer writer begins a new article, or a drinker discusses a fine new beer you will be remembered. A collection of Michael's work can be found on the internet @www.beerhunter.com and there was a National Toast to Michael on Sept 30th at Toronado in San Francisco in aid of The National Parkinson Foundation. He is probably smiling somewhere at all the fuss.


The launch also saw the new brewery licensed bar in action and was attended by the press and members of Derby CAMRA. Derventio,



Thornbridge win in regional beer poll

Regulars in pubs across the East Midlands and South Yorkshire have chosen Thornbridge Brewery's Jaipur India Pale Ale as their favourite real ale for 2007. In a very high turnout contest held throughout the Castle Rock Brewery estate of 23 pubs, a majority of the 1,400 voters picked the 5.9% IPA from the Derbyshire brewer as their favourite. Second place went to Summer Lightning from Hop Back Brewery.

According to Tynemill's commercial director, Colin Wilde, the

results in this the ninth year of competition, were once again very close. "Our customers have shown they welcome good beers from wherever they originate and I'm particularly pleased this year that a newcomer to brewing has made its mark so well."

Voting in Castle Rock Brewery's pubs was conducted through the Autumn with regulars putting forward

their favourites from many hundreds of real ales available through the year.

Stacey Webster from Thornbridge Brewery says, "To win this award is a tremendous boost for us all at the brewery. Many thanks to Chris and his colleagues for their support over the last two years, and of course, for leading a revolution we are glad to be a part of. All the Castle Rock pubs have been very supportive of our beers since our launch with Jaipur IPA being a particular favourite at our near neighbours, Derby's Alexandra Hotel and the Derby Tup in Chesterfield," she says.

Colin Wilde says, "This remains the only regional poll of its kind and its importance seems to grow each year. Once again though, six regular ales didn't qualify for the event as they come

from Castle Rock Brewery, which we own," he says. "They've been excluded to remove any hint of in-house bias."

The award ceremony was held at the Canalhouse on Canal Street, Nottingham, on 30 October 2007.

Sad end for Roebuck



Over the last month or so a sorry picture has been painted on Amy Street, Derby where what remains of the Roebuck Inn stands in seemingly terminal decline. The pub has had its roof removed and much of the upper brickwork. Two 120-year-old trees in the garden were removed in a couple of hours.

The pub is an interesting stone building with mullioned and transomed windows. It also has a war memorial to the local fallen, which should not be permitted to disappear.

Some of the Alton's Brewery insignia remained on the wall when our picture was taken in early November.

Your editor represented the pub in the Derbyshire Pub Quiz League for a couple of years in the mid-1990s when the licensee was John Brentnall.

Jok Arguile expands the history: The Roebuck dated from the 1890'a and was an Altons pub from day one (30 Sept 1889) tak-

ing its license (and licensee) from its namesake on Bridge Gate which had been in existence since 1818. In the interwar period one licensee, John Walker, held sway (1909 to 1934). In the 1990s the Roebuck was held by John Brentnall for nearly ten years (1992 2001) - unusual in this day and age. It was one of the better pubs in the Stockbrook/ Parliament area with a good lounge and, sometimes, good beer. The most recent landlord who held the place together decently was Billy Parker, mine host from 2003-05.

Unlike many of the neighbouring pubs it was purpose built rather than a house conversion and Ind Coope who took over Altons & Strettons (in 1934) in general, looked after their houses. Architecturally it was a cut above.

By the end of November only the doors and the lower course of brickwork remained. The whereabouts of the war memorial are now uncertain.

Greene Kinged in Little Chester

The Furnace Inn on Duke Street, Derby has followed its near neighbour the Duke of Clarence, on Mansfield Road, in having a complete Greene King livery overhaul, including GK XX Mild, rare for the area, and a new inn sign. The previous sign had only been in place for a few months.

This rebranding is a portent of the shape of things to come across the former Hardy & Hansons estate. At least the Furnace sign depicts the industrial heritage of the area rather than the deeply boring, standardised GK sign comprising just the brewery logo and the pub name that have been rolled out in the Home Counties.
