

New Home for Derby Winter Fest -24th - 26th February 2011



This year Derby CAMRA's 10th Winter Beer Festival is moving! It's off to The Roundhouse, on Pride Park - but never fear it's not hard to get to - or home from! The festival will feature a massive range of interesting/exciting beers for you to try along with a few you'll probably be familiar with.

The Roundhouse was the first railway Roundhouse built in the world, built by the North Midland Railway in 1893, it was later used by the LMS (London Midland & Scottish Railway) and finally British Railways before closing and becoming derelict. It was then revitalised by Derby College and given a new lease of life in 2009.



As always at the Winter Festival we'll be bringing you a vast variety of beer styles from around the UK, and perhaps further afield too this year. We always bring a wide range of styles to the festival from the more usual golden hoppy ales to the down right odd and exotic, with a few more in between for good measure. It's still a bit early to say too much more at the time of writing (threeand-a-bit months prefestival) but don't worry there'll be something for everyone whatever your taste. We hope to bring you an




Transport



How do I get there / Where is it? Has been one of the most commonly asked questions about the festivals new venue, well it's not hard we assure you. The festival venue itself is The Roundhouse, Roundhouse Way, Pride Park, Derby, DE24 8JE. If that doesn't help here's a map and walking directions for the festival.

In summary though the festival is a 10/15 minute walk from the city centre, five minutes from the Brunswick and the Alexandra Hotel and two minutes from the Railway Station (use the pride park exit and it's in front of you!).

We're also laying on a FREE shuttle bus running approximately every 15 from the City Centre to the Festival. The buses will run from just before opening time until 21:30 (last departure from the festival). They will run from the Full St lay-by adjacent to the Assembly Rooms (tbc) to the festival itself and back



again. The buses will be operated by Harpurs Coaches and should probably look a bit like our picture!

Once the buses have stopped running for the night there's still a number of options of how to get home if a stroll via a pub or two into town doesn't take your fancy. As the railway station footbridge is open to pedestrians by this time you can nip across the bridge and catch a bus from outside the Waterfall into the Bus Station served by Arriva routes 40, 44 and 45 and Kinchbus Skylink at night (more daytime). Or you can of course call a taxi from your favourite cab firm for a short hop in to the city centre.

MR GRUNDY'S

Trenchfoot has been launched finally and is available not only at the brewery and their other outlet at Uttoxeter - the Bank House - but at a few nearby pubs such as the Crescent on Wild Street. Brian Collins, the brewer, says that the Coffin Nail Stout (5.0 % ABV) is to follow.

ROWDITCH

BSB has joined the Rowditch range and was to be found alongside RSB (Rachel's Special Brew) the other weekend - see also Dancing Duck (q.v). A 4.7% golden ale has also been brewed in November.

WIRKSWORTH

2010 has been another success year for the brewery which now sees them brewing to capacity. Following an initial trial over the festive period, off sales have been available to the public throughout the year. A selection of beers can be purchased in branded fourpint jugs direct from the brewhouse. Carnivals and farmers markets are also being supplied.

BUXTON & THE BATTLE OF THE BEERS

The new Buxton Brewery, run by Geoff Quinn and Pete Clark, has in just twelve months, gone from strength to strength. Production has increased six fold and their beers are now to be found in free trade pubs

from Derby up to Stockport and across several adjacent counties. Validation of their popularity came in the recent 'Battle of the Beers' contest run by Chesterfield CAMRA as part of their Market Festival. This blind test contest of eight local brews, by a CAMRA panel, resulted in a hoppier version of Buxton's Kinder Downfall being judged as the outright winner.



COPPICE SIDE BREWERY - HEANOR

Yet another new brewer, Chris Turner, has started up in business in the county. Chris, formerly a print production director and long time real-ale lover, only launched Coppice Side brewery in the late summer but already his beers are getting wide appreciation in an increasingly discerning market. He was guided by Richard Creighton, of Leadmill Brewery in choosing





Rachel's Duck Dances into Derby

Rachel Mathews, is a new name on the brewing circuit, but she has already made a mark locally as the skill behind the Rowditch Brewery's RSB. Now she is on the point of launching her own brewery, the Dancing Duck Brewery, just off Ashbourne Road, Derby.

Why Dancing Duck? 'Duck' dates back to when Rachel, from Wolverhampton, first came to the area 14 years ago with her husband Ian, and was taken aback to being addressed as 'mi duck' And 'dancing', Rachel and Ian say, comes down to the fact that having a beer should always be about enjoying yourself.


A passionate home brewer, Rachel then trained for 16 months with *Blue Monkey* at their Ilkeston base, where she got valuable hands on experience when the outfit was winning awards by the score. And, had John Hickling been willing to sell her the plant, she would now be setting up there. But Ilkeston's loss is Derby's gain.

So now Ashbourne Road has two breweries again (once it had Wealls and Strettons) and both have brand new kit. But there the similarity ends as Mr Grundy's 3.5 brl kit was shoehorned into a large hotel bedroom whereas the 10brl 'Dancing Duck' plant occupies a spacious former car body repair shop with room to expand.

Rachels's first two beers will be 'Gold' (4.7% ABV) a fairly bitter ale using First Gold hops and 'Twenty Two' (4.3% ABV) a brown beer using crystal and chocolate malt and Cascade hops ('twenty two' otherwise being two little ducks). A third beer, provisionally called 'Ey up' (as in 'Ey up/Ay up mi duck') a light hoppy beer will follow later. Rachel isn't yet sure whether to use the 'Ey Up' – per Rick

Scollins or the alternative 'Ay up'- often now used.

Later in the day a stout is promised, but Rachel insists it will be quite different from B l u e Monkey's




deservedly popular *Guerilla*, that she once brewed. Rachel hopes to have her first beer on sale before Christmas, but failing that to have it available at Derby CAMRA's Winter Ale festival in February at the Roundhouse.



CAMRA LocAle is an initiative that promotes pubs which regularly stock at least one real ale which is brewed by a local brewery that is within 20 miles



driving distance The geographical shape of the Derby and Amber

Valley Branch area means that some breweries are within 20 miles of some parts of the branch area but not others.

The scheme builds on a growing consumer demand for quality local produce and an increased awareness of 'green' issues. The scheme was created in 2007 by CAMRA's Nottingham branch which wanted to help support the tradition of brewing within Nottinghamshire.

Everyone benefits from local pubs stocking locally-brewed real ale...

- Public houses as stocking local real ales can increase pub visits
- Consumers who enjoy greater beer choice and diversity
- Local brewers who gain from

increased sales

- The local economy because more money is spent and retained locally







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CAMRA Discount Pubs

As you may be aware, The Campaign for Real Ale (CAMRA) is a national organisation with over 100,000 members. This is made up of a number of local branches, of which Derby is one. In the Derby branch area there are hundreds of members, all of whom are thirsty drinkers.

In some areas of the country, publicans offer a discount to card carrying CAMRA members, often in the region of 10-25p per pint of Real Ale or Traditional Cider. This scheme is very popular within the nearby Nottingham area with upwards of 20 pubs taking part. A list of the participating pubs is printed in every issue of The Nottingham Drinker.

The Derby branch is trying to collate a list of pubs in the Derby area that are currently offering, or would like to offer a similar discount.

If you wish to take part in this scheme, your pub would be mentioned in every issue of *Derby Drinker* and *Mild & Bitter* (Derby member's only monthly news letter), listing the discount you give. As well as this you will be included on the Derby CAMRA website and the National CAMRA website, this will help visitors to this area locate your pub. A5 empty belly posters can be provided to advertise the scheme in your pub. A sample membership card can be provided to ensure that this discount is only given to the people who it is aimed at.

This scheme will hopefully benefit you by raising awareness of your pub and encouraging CAMRA members to drink in other pubs out of their comfort zone, whilst the discount may encourage others to join CAMRA.


