he Derby CAMRA Branch Pub of the Year Awards were presented recently at specially organised, well attended socials at each pub where Branch members mingled with the locals to enjoy the occasion. The overall Branch Pub of the Year & City Pub of the Year Winner, the Furnace Inn on Duke Street in Derby saw the full contingent of pub staff in attendance to receive the award (see front page photo) from Derby CAMRA Chairman, Gareth Stead who gave an anecdotal, Shiny speech to mark the award. The Chairman was also on hand at the Little Chester Ale House on the same night to give owner, George Lambert the runner-up award for Derby's first Micro Pub innovation (see front page photo).

The Country Pub of the Year Winner's Presentation also proved to be a popular event at the Pattenmakers Arms in Duffield where Claire Muldoon and Emily Bowler (see front page photo) were delighted to receive the award from Gareth Stead and a put on a marvellous buffet to send

everyone home happy. Since the occasion we have also had the great news that the licensees are staying after a long dispute with owners, Enterprise Inns. Finally, the Royal Oak at Ockbrook team (see front page photo) were pleased to accept their runners-up award from CAMRA National Executive member, Julian Hough who went on to receive a lifetime achievement award at the Derby CAMRA AGM for his long service to the campaign both locally, regionally and nationally (see photo below, Julian on the left accepts tankard from Branch Chairman, Gareth Stead).






A vast selection of beers from near and far will be the backdrop of the festival along with ciders, meads and continental beverages. Various food stalls will also be present. The theme for this year's festival is celebrating 50 years of Derby Mountain Rescue, which we hope you will agree is a very worthy cause. The event will be showcasing at least one beer from every Derbyshire brewery, giving special attention to the breweries located within the City of Derby - the best place to sample real ale in the world. The Assembly Rooms staff and Derby Live are working closely with the committee to help make the event a huge success. The festival capacity will be on a scale with previous years. However the event will have a whole new feel being outdoors and all on ground level. Luckily last year has proved to be good practice for the volunteers with the marquee being present.

Real Ale Capital Status Confirmed as Derby Provides a Beer Festival Every Day of the Year

A recent edition of the Lonely Plant Guide described Derby as the "Best place to drink Real Ale in the World" and who are we to disagree as the results of the City's **Annual Beer Census** undertaken by members of The Derby Branch of the Campaign for Real Ale have confirmed Derby's status as **Real Ale Capital of Britain** per population head for yet another year.

The census took place in February and involved 8 different pub crawls around the City which saw a **record number of Real Ales** available on any one given night. 325 were counted (up 49 on last year) with 195 different ones available (up 15 on last year) and these came from just 71 pubs averaging 4.5 Real Ales per pub.

In total **78 pubs** were visited, 2 were shut and 5 had no real ale. **9 pubs had 10 or more Real Ales on** and leading the way was the Babington Arms (16), Brunswick (14), Five Lamps (14), Flowerpot (13), Alexandra (11),

Furnace (11), Mr Grundy's (11), Standing Order (11) and Thomas Leaper (10).

Marstons Pedigree is still the most dominant brand in the City available in 31 pubs with Sharp's Doom Bar coming up fast on the rails in 20 pubs and Bass in 10 pubs. But local ales are well represented with beers from 12 of the City's breweries widely available -Brunswick, Black Iris, Dancing Duck, Derby, Derventio, Falstaff, Hartshorns, Mr Grundy's, Rowditch, Shiny, Titan and Wentwell. Beers from other breweries around the area were also well represented - Blue Monkey, Burton Bridge, Castle Rock, Leatherbritches, Nutbrook and Thornbridge to name a few.

The average price of a pint was found to be £2.94 (7p up on last year). However in reality a lot of pubs were hovering around the £3 a pint mark with some now regularly topping it. But it was pleasing to see a lot more

pubs offering the CAMRA discount on pints and half's. The dearest pint of the night was found to be a whopping £3.60 at the Tap for Timothy Taylors Landlord (which was only £3 at the Brunswick). The honours for the cheapest pint went to the Abbey at Darley Abbey where Sam Smiths Old Brewery Bitter was £1.80 a pint.

So there you have it, a few stats to bear in mind while crawling around Beer City once again proving that per population head Derby has more Real Ales available than any other City.

Derby CAMRA Chairman, Gareth Stead said "For Real Ale enthusiasts Derby is probably the best place to drink in Britain, if not the World as the Lonely Planet Guide states. People come from far and wide to sample the City's delights as its pubs truly provide a Beer Festival every day of the year".




Derbyshire Ale 24 Years On Part 2

In the second of the three part series, Paul Gibson looks at the fluctuating fortunes of some of the outlying pubs listed in **Derbyshire Ale.** The 1990 guide was a collaboration of Derbyshire CAMRA branches, listing 800 real ale pubs, and those which were featured are in **bold** type. Such was the popularity of **Derbyshire Ale** that not one, but two reprints had to be ordered.

There have been some notable success stories at pubs that are now within the Amber Valley CAMRA branch area. At various times in the last ten years, the Hunter Arms, Kilburn, the Black Bull's Head, Openwoodgate and Old Oak, Horsley Woodhouse, have all been closed. Industrious and imaginative persons have rescued them and this has been recognised by CAMRA Pub of the Year awards to all three. Mark and Paula Showers bought the Hunter in 2009 and turned a struggling, Victorian, Bass pub into a thriving freehouse serving quality ales and good food. The striking frontage of the Hunter was captured in a high quality line drawing by the guide's Editor, Reg Newcombe. The Creighton family has turned around the fortunes of the Old Oak which was threatened with demolition before the Creighton's acquired the Woodhouse pub that enjoys far reaching rural views. Multiple choice of the real stuff and the popular RuRaD bar combined to propel the Oak to the last 16 of the nation's CAMRA Pub of the Year competition in 2009. Alas, the Jolly Colliers (Ward's) and Knife and Steel (Ind Coope) in Woodhouse haven't survived. The

above Belper at Openwoodgate between 1954 and 1978 but following Greene King's take-over of Hardy and Hanson the handsome hostelry closed. Andy Horsfall and Nikki Butt have revived the place in spectacular style and opened the rustic Bedlam Bar where, at weekends, beer aficionados congregate.

Heanor, the former mining town, was well pubbed and beer buffs would seek out the Ravs Arms on Ray Street, for its Hoskin's (Leicester) ales. The multi roomed, well upholstered interior was the perfect place to enjoy a pint or two of the superb Penn's Ale. Sadly, this imposing pub has called last orders but despite this, and other losses, there are still several good watering holes including the newly crowned Erewash CAMRA Pub of the Year, the Butcher's Arms down Hands Road in Langley. The Queen's Head (ex-Shipstone's), at nearby Marlpool remains worthy of attention, but towards Ripley along the A610 at Loscoe, the ancient Coach and Horses (Hardy and Hanson) was demolished earlier this year. In Ripley itself, half of the dozen listed pubs have closed. It's pleasing to report, however, that thanks to Amber Ales having breathed new life into the former Shipstone's house, the Talbot (Taphouse) on Butterley Hill, and J D Wetherspoon installing a good range of guest beers at the Red Lion, the town's beerscape looks much brighter. Enterprising licensees at the Pear Tree, Holly Bush and Beehive have also helped to rekindle interest in real ale.



The elixir known as Ruddle's County was a big draw at the Chequers, Ticknall, which I first had the pleasure of visiting in 1975. I recall the dulcet tones of Radio Derby's Barry Ecclestone's commentary of the Rams' thrashing of Real Madrid in the European Cup on the pub's radio. How times change: Ruddle's Rutland brewery has slipped into history, the lovely, 16thC Chequers faces an uncertain future, and will the Rams ever reach the same dizzy heights again? The white painted Sir Francis Burdett on a sharp bend before entering Melbourne also sold Ruddle's County, but was de-licensed many years ago. In 1969, John Thompson, a market gardener, converted the ground floor of his home, a former farmhouse, into the eponymous John Thompson pub. And it was here in Ingleby that Derbyshire's dormant brewing industry revived in 1977 when the wonderfully fruity JTS XXX was launched. John's son, Nick, now runs the pub and brewery.
















One of the most improved pubs over the years is near Sawley Marina, namely the **White Lion**, which is also the home of Old Sawley Brewing Company. The light, airy interior has a central servery with Bass and Blue Monkey BG Sips vying for attention with ever changing guests frequently from micro-breweries. Also, 4 real ciders were present when I visited. Brewing is currently upstairs but a new brew house adjacent to the pleasant, outside seating area, will fire its copper from September. Saturday and Sunday tend to be the days most likely to offer the home brews.

The Green Man and Black's Head, long the bastion of Ashbourne's real ale scene, is a profound loss, though it's mooted that new licensed premises may be incorporated within the redevelopment. The Howard Arms, Cubley, was a cracking, multi roomed, Marston's house that's now the private residence of a multi-instrumentalist and singer/song writer from the 60s and 70s.

The cosy New Inn (Bass), Hazelwood Road, Duffield, has gone, as has the Vaults, Wirksworth, a convert to Sam Smith's in the 70s. In nearby Middleton, Alan Johnson has resuscitated the Nelson Arms, and the Rising Sun continues to prosper, although the **Duke of Wellington** (Bass) has closed. Up the hill from "Wuzzer", at Bolehill, lay the Miner's Standard, a stonebuilt tavern of considerable character with a landlady serving Draught Bass straight from the cask. This, alas, is another casualty. And it isn't just out of the way places, such as Bolehill, that have felt the wind of change that's sweeping through the pub trade. On the main A6 at Whatstandwell, two former Hardy and Hanson houses no longer slake the thirst of day trippers returning from tourist hot-spots. The Homesford Cottage with its unmissable "Kimberley Ales" writ large upon the roof of the building opposite is now a B&B, and the **Derwent Hotel** serves coffee and cakes instead of Kimberley ales. These pubs dispensed Kimberley beer through electric pumps, a method of dispense favoured by Nottingham brewers but now extinct like the old breweries themselves.

Another Hardy and Hanson pub, the **Queen's Head,** Little Eaton, was a plain but welcoming two roomer that fell into decline under Greene King's stewardship. Happily, however, it's been transformed by Derby Brewing Company with its beers and locally sourced food featuring. Derby Brewing Company has also acquired the **Kedleston Hotel**, whose opening we eagerly await.

The next Derby Drinker will conclude the Derbyshire Ale review by looking at some city pubs that fell on hard times but then revived in startling style.


The Smith's Tavern played host on April 4th to the 50th birthday celebrations of yours truly, with a specially brewed one-off 9-gallon barrel available to all, commissioned from the Hopcraft Brewery in Suth Wales, with recipe input and physical assistance with the mashing coming from my family. This was a dark oatmeal stout/porter brewed at 5.0% and was universally received extremely well, not least by myself...christened "Gristy's Fifty", it was offered free to all-comers, but we asked for donations to MacMillan Cancer Support and with the aid of a magnificent single donation of £200, we raised an incredible £447, rounded up to £450. My heartfelt thanks go out to all.

The Bentley Brook Inn at Fenny Bentley will be holding its annual beer festival starting on Friday 23rd May through to Monday 26th May, as well the Black Cow at Dalbury Lees, so this is a great opportunity on a long weekend to visit a couple of good local festivals.

Whatpub.com offers over thirty different search fields ranging from dog friendly pubs to those that offer newspapers or live music, making the results customizable to each person's individual preferences. Another key feature is that of the 35,800 real ale pubs featured, around 22,000 have details of the real ales being served - taking the guess work out of a visit for real ale lovers. A full entry offers a description and pictures of the pub, the address, opening hours, who owns it, lists the regular real ales they stock, states whether the pub offers Guest Beers, highlights the pubs main features e.g. availability of food, gives a map of where the pubcan be located, sat nav reference, OS reference and highlights the local transport available.



Welcome to the Mild in May and Summer Ale Trail. The trail officially starts on the 10th May and runs up to the start of the 37th Derby City Charter Summer Beer Festival on the 9th July, so you have plenty of time to get supping. To complete the trail, you need to drink at least half a pint of Mild or Real Ale in each of the pubs listed and collect an appropriately coloured sticker. A completed trail card will then entitle you to free entry to one session of the Summer Beer Festival and some free beer. Pubs marked with an (*) at least will not have Mild on during the whole of May. The table below lists the pubs in the trail together with their address, opening times and directions on getting there. Trail Details, Instructions & Beer Scoring

This year we have merged the Mild in May promotion with the Summer Beer Festival Ale Trail. The Trail will be launched for the 10th May and run until the 37th City Charter Summer Beer Festival on 9th July 2014. Participants will initially be collecting red "mild" stickers from each pub in return for drinking a half or more of Mild. At the end of May participants will then additionally be able to collect blue "real ale" stickers in return for drinking the same quantity of Real Ale. 





with Suzie

We've had some fine spring weather recently, so what could be better than a tour around Herefordshire. It's a lovely unspoilt county and home to lots of first class small and medium sized cider makers. The bonus here is the perry because Herefordshire is the natural home of perry making; most of the cider makers here also make perry.

First stop is Newton Court, some 4 miles south of Leominster. Here Paul Stevens runs a working farm with a fine herd of cattle (Herefords, of course). There is a shop selling his cider and perry, I had some Yarlington Mill cider and his new-season (2013 vintage) perry has available; still a bit sweet but full flavoured. In common with many of the smaller producers his cider and perry are organic without being certified as such; official accreditation is quite expensive and many small producers don't regard it as worthwhile.

A short distance away at Sutton St. Nicholas is Rathays Old Goat Cider, run by Graham
Blackmore. This is a very small operation and a prior appointment is required. The "Old Goat" is due to the herd of angora goats, very friendly too, who live there. The excellent cider and perry are mainly due to a fine, mature orchard, planted by Bulmer's in the 1960's. This is more of a hobby than a commercial operation, but it is a real gem.

Also a short distance away, at Ocle Pychard (lovely name) we find Oliver's cider, run by Tom Oliver. This is another working farm, but with sheep rather than cattle. Tom has another interest, going on the road, on tour with various bands, but he still has time to make plenty of quality cider and perry. Both are available through the farm shop in draught or bottles. Oliver's is a multiple award winner, both at a regional and national level.

Towards the Welsh border, near Abbey Dore we arrive at Gwatkins cider. Dennis Gwatkins, with his bushy beard and braces is one of the real characters of the cider scene. This is another working farm, complete with an excellent farm shop selling a wide range of farm produce as well as cider, the smoked streaky bacon being especially delicious. Gwatkins specializes in single apple varieties; his Stoke Red is smooth tasting and pretty sweet. A good medium is his Norman cider, while for those liking something really dry I'd recommend the Foxwhelp.

No tour of Herefordshire would be complete without a visit to my final destination, Ross-on-Wye Cider & Perry Co. Ltd. at Peterstow, otherwise known as Broome Farm. This is an idyllic spot, with the farmhouse and outbuildings set amongst extensive orchards. These are all cider apple and perry pear trees with a large range of varieties represented, some quite rare. The proprietor is Mike Johnson and you will soon find yourself in his

sampling cellar, a place that is difficult to leave! Mike has made a point of offering help and encouragement to other budding cider makers in the area, as well as holding a number of open days each year, so Broome Farm has become the hub for cider making in that part of Herefordshire. Also available at the farmhouse are cream teas, evening meals (with cider) and accommodation, so it is an excellent spot for a short break.



Beer, Brats and Burgers


The juvenile delinquents, along with the flea-bitten family pet, now invade the beer garden, where they plague those poor stateless


