**An Extravaganza of Possibility** 

t 5pm on Wednesday 21st February A 2018 Derby CAMRA will throw open the gates at The Roundhouse, Pride Park, for the fourteenth Derby Winter Ale Festival and what a spectacular show they have for you!

There is likely to be something on offer for most drinkers, with the very best winter style beers from across the East Midlands balanced by an interesting selection of other beer styles. The cider and perry bar will have an exquisite offering some of which have been earmarked for Derby since mid August. Derby's appetite for mead, a fermented honey drink, has increased year on year and again there will be a bar serving this fascinating and delicious drink. The experienced World Beer Bar Team have over the years established some unique supply relationships which ensure you will find arguable one of the finest selections of bottled beers and some peerless draught ales for your delight. It's said there might even be some prosecco and wine being sold by the World Beer Bar!

Having learned just how much you love CAMRA's Derby Winter Festival our Chair Russell Gilbert has asked all wet stock orderers to ensure they order enough beer, cider and perry to match your thirst. Russell's aim is to have a good selection on sale when we close the Festival on the Saturday night.

Did you know the Festival is staffed by volunteers? If you are interested, you can get involved by completing an online form: http://www.derbycamra.org.uk/winter-beerfestival/ For months now meetings have been taking place in pubs around Derby as volunteers conjure with a variety of options to ensure that your visit is as wonderful as possible.

As time slowly moves forward, 2018 becomes a reality as the plans solidify it is clear this year will be even more exciting than 2017. For the first time we will have new entrance arrangements taking on board the popular tokens which debuted in July 2017 at the City Charter Beer Festival.

The good news is we are planning to offer the stylish £10 deal, which is £7 of tokens plus £3 for one of our very limited edition glasses. This was well liked when introduced in July and worked well. (Remember you can get the money back on your glass as long as it's not chipped or damaged on exit). Additional tokens can be purchased during your visit to our fabulous festival, and unused tokens exchanged for their cash value as you leave.

When you enter the Festival, if you turn left you will find the much loved additional seating in the library area. The Cloak Room is situated here too, staffed by The Derby Mountain Rescue who, for a donation they will look after you coat and bag until you want to collect them again. Derby Mountain



Rescue are a voluntary emergency service who attend callouts in response to requests from the Police, and they are on call 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. You might not be aware but Derby Mountain Rescue consists entirely of unpaid volunteers, with a main function to search and rescue for missing or injured people, principally in upland or mountainous areas. They are happy for you to pop over and have a chat with them, if they are not too busy.

At the far end of the library/corridor is The Carriage Room where all the East Midlands winter style beer will be stillaged – so if you like porters, stouts, strong mild, old ales, strong old ales or barley wines this is the area for you! This is also where you will find Derby's very own Shiny Brewing Company. Expanding and relocating in 2016 to Long Eaton, Pedro Menon is the visionary driving force behind this popular, strikingly successful, award winning and innovative brewery. Don't miss the opportunity to have a chat with the Shiny Team while checking out what's hot on their bar!

Moving back up the corridor towards the main entrance you'll find on the right hand side our external music marquee which is returning this year. This means there are improved acoustics, and more space to dance and meet friends - boom! Result. Tucked inside will be a Cider & Perry Bar and Dancing Duck Brewery, which is Rachel and Ian Matthews champion award winning brewery. Dancing Duck achieved distinction in 2015 when their Dark Drake, an oatmeal stout, was judged the very best beer in England by CAMRA. Their moto is: "Serious about Beer!" and you are certainly in for a treat as there is quality, passion and layers of flavour in every glass.

Entering the main Roundhouse you may well gasp in awe at the vision before you. The plan





is to open with over 350 different draught beers stillaged in the round in addition to two Brewery Bars, a Cider and Perry Bar, the World Beer Bar and Mead Bar. This year we are delighted to be joined at two sensational Brewery Bars – Peak Ales and Brunswick Brewing Company.

Derbyshire's Peak Ales was created by Robert and Debra Evans in January 2003 and the Team at Peak have spent the 15 years since getting continually better and better. Peak Ales have won multiple awards and recently expanded into a 20 barrel purpose built premises in Ashford in the Water. Peak Ales are rightly confident that they create "simply magnificent pints" and we have no argument with this as you will discover.

Brunswick Brewing Company, Derby's oldest brewery, is under the capable leadership of Head Brewer James Salmon, enriched by Alan Pickersgill and Philippe Larroche's involvement as pub tenants of The Brunswick Inn. This is an award winning brewery with a contemporary quality lead approach. The range and variety of beers Brunswick Brewing Company create are peerless and delicious, so form a queue!

As you leave or enter the festival in the late afternoon, (and all day Saturday) you will meet our second charity who are Rotary Club of Derby Daybreak. This year their volunteers are collecting for RNIB's Talking Books and The DART appeal at The Royal Derby

- RNIB's Talking Books is a service that provides the spoken word in audio format for those who can no longer read the written word. For many Talking Books are indispensable not only as a pastime but also for learning and staying informed about what's going on in the world. Each adult Talking Book costs £2,500. Derby Daybreak has the goal to sponsor at least
- The DART appeal at Royal Derby Hospital is aimed at purchasing extra state of the art radiotherapy equipment and also embraces the development of a new light and airy reception/waiting area for patients and relatives visiting for treatment.

Derby CAMRA are proud to be associated with both our charities, Derby Mountain



Rescue and Rotary Club of Derby Daybreak, and we hope that you our customers will be proud to support them as well.

Most importantly, some say, you will

find a delicious selection of hot & cold food, hopefully catering for all dietary requirements in the main Roundhouse itself. Mr Morgan and his delicious cheese stall is back, as it Pipers Crisps and Oddfellows Chocolate so there really is something for everyone to eat. It could just be that Derby's Winter Ale Festival 2018 could be your ideal trip out, somewhere with a choice of what to drink, where you are likely to bump into friends, with live bands in the evenings a selection of food and in a good location. Did you know we have some of the very best live cover bands performing most evenings? There is an article about them in this magazine which sets out who's playing when so that you can plan your visit and not miss anvone.

Remember if you join CAMRA admission is free to all sessions for card carrying CAMRA Members. We'll have a Membership stall on site who can explain how to join to you, but if you want to join in advance you can do here: http://www.camra.org.uk/join

The festival will open with over 450 different draught beers on sale throughout the venue in three areas, and as it progresses towards the final evening the number of beers available will decrease. The master plan however, is not to run out but to ensure there is still plenty of choice right up to the final whistle on Saturday night.

If you haven't been to a beer festival for a while or have never been before it's an amazing event, you are in for an exciting and interesting time. Admission prices vary, see the table below for more details:


Note There are no advance tickets available as this is a pay on the door event.

# Beer Festival With Suzie

t seems to come round quickly, but we are well into planning the cider bar for the Derby Winter Ales Festival at the Roundhouse which will run from February 21st to 24th 2018. The setup will be the same as last year, with the principal cider bar in the Main Hall and a second cider bar (selling different ciders / perries) in the Carriage Room. As always we will have a selection of locally produced ciders, in particular Sisson & Smith from Eastwood which is the current East Midlands Campion Cider (judged at Nottingham Festival 2017). It is a 6% medium cider, made from local fruit, with a proper cider flavour and aftertaste. Winning at Nottingham means that this cider will go forward to the National Cider Judging at Reading next May, Congratulations to Alistair Smith on winning this prestigious award.

Our trawl through Somerset will see a mixture of old favourites and a few new to the festival. Westcroft Janets Jungle Juice, three times National Champion cider, Sheppys Medium Sweet and Wilkins Farmhouse need no introduction. If you are in the area and have never been to Wilkins Farm near Wedmore you should; it is an amazing mixture of rural life, drinking fine cider and putting the world to rights. Also from Somerset will be Orchard Pig Philosopher, also

Chilli & Ginger (a quirky mixture, there will be plenty of flavoured ciders on the bar), and from nearby Nempnett Piglet's Perry. Further on into Devon no bar would be complete without Winkleigh; we will have their Autumn Scrumpy (somewhat mis-named in my view since it is clear, medium sweet and easy drinking, albeit at 7.5%), also their Blackcurrant cider.

Heading out East we will have two fruit ciders from Bottle Kicking from Leicestershire, Pineapple Peach and Passion Fruit will be one of them. Then on to Peterborough where we find the ever popular Hubz cider, 'Ang Over at 8% and an only slightly weaker Cranberry and Raspberry cider are the likely candidates from here. Further on in Cambridgeshire is Glebe Farm. It's a bit big and commercial, but the range of fruit ciders is impressive; the two from here are likely to be Cherry and Mango.

Midlands cider production is centred on Herefordshire but also encompasses Worcestershire and Gloucestershire. From Worcester we will have Barbourne strawberry and painted lady perry. From Pembridge in Herefordshire we will have Dunkertons. It is quite upmarket, and much of their cider is bottled and sold in top London stores (so I am told), however they have extensive orchards and

make high quality traditional cider and perry, we will concentrate on the draught versions for the festival. Another quality cider is Carey Organic, from Carey near Ross-on-Wye. This is a medium dry, high tannin cider made on an all organic fruit and vegetable farm. In fact a lot of the cider sold, particularly from smaller producers is suitable for vegetarians, even vegans, but I would not claim this unless it has official accreditation. Best to check on the producer's website if you are interested. Close by, and not to be missed if you are in the area is the Ross Cider and Perry Co. (better known as Broome Farm) at Peterstow. This has always been a mecca for cider enthusiasts, but it is even better now with a well-stocked shop and their own pub (the Yew Tree) and a campsite. They do an extensive range of ciders and perries, some single variety; you will have to wait for the festival program / website to see exactly what we have from there.

On a different note Amber Valley Branch have just completed judging for their Cider Pub of the Year. The winner is the Talbot at Ripley, and the runner-up Angels Bar at Belper. If you are not familiar with these pubs both are well worth a visit.





# Derby CAMRA Branch

#### **Business Rates Update**

Following on from the last article I wrote in Derby Drinker 176 Page 5, I am very pleased to inform you that we have achieved that aim and all pubs entitled to the rates rebate have now had bills adjusted to deduct it of December & January amounts to be paid.

I would like to point out that Leicester City Council and Rugby Council allocated this money to the pubs in their areas by July 2017!

Derby City Councils Baggy Shanker blamed "a snap general election in June" in his letter dated 6th October 2017, as far as I believe a lame excuse.

Did the General Election not take place in Leicester or Rugby, Baggy?

#### What do you want me to tackle next?

Yes it's your branch, and your call.

We had a lively debate on 30th November 2017 at The Brunswick over a motion about cask ale and CAMRA's focus and priority towards it. It was great to see so many new and engaging faces.

I want to do more of this and the committee will be setting out priorities for you to choose what we tackle next.

1/ Business Rates is a really unfair tax on our pubs and small retail businesses which threatens the existence of many. We in the pub industry and you as a drinker pay approximately 4 times the amount of rates compared to the amount we take in hard pound notes of other businesses. Plus we are extremely highly taxed on top of that by excise duty on beer and VAT. Our pubs are dying in many cases because of the tax burden.

Do you want me to fight the cause of business rates reform, £5k rate relief and beer tax reduction?

2/ Do you know that pubs which give a CAMRA Discount do at the expense of the individual pub? Or ones who take spoons vouchers? CAMRA do not refund this money to any of them.

20p off a pint for some who visit once a week or even once a year when regular customers of that pub often get nothing. Join CAMRA I hear you say. But are we a purchasing organisation or a campaigning organisation?

Many of our pubs offer very reasonably priced ale in comparison to other cities we all visit.

After June 2016 the currency has devalued meaning imports of hops used to make our beer often 30% more expensive now and the pressure at the pub will be even greater to raise prices this coming year.

Should we question our aim in asking for CAMRA Discount to help the pub's viability?

3/ Derby City Council are talking about a new initiative to drive tourism into our city, I hear it called Alco Tourism. Derby the city of Alco Tourism doesn't sound good. Derby Capital of Real Ale is far better.


In my opinion we have got Beer Tourism and I call upon the council to contact me to help shape this policy and not destroy what we have by calling it something which makes me think of Alcoholics and Alcopops!

Please Derby City Council consult a group like us, and our brewers, to help you sort this idea out to benefit the city not harm what it already has.

If you have a topic you want to fight for please let me know. I know how passionate you are. I saw your passion at the last branch meeting.

Let us fight for the Great British Pub and Pint of Ale in our great city!

#### **Pub News**

Mid-November saw the opening of the **Pothole** micropub at the Park Farm shopping centre in Allestree, Derby. Six ever changing real ales and four traditional ciders should be available. Please note that the Pothole is closed between Monday and Wednesday opening Thursday 12-9pm, Fri & Sat 12-10pm and Sundays 1-6pm. The pub consists of a single room with the bar to the back, but does have a games room. The beers normally include one from the Littleover Brewery. Catch the Allestree bus from Derby City Centre to get there.

A new Bavarian Bar, **Stein Strasse** opened on the Wardwick in Derby recently. As well as all the traditional German products you'd expect such as Pils, Wheat beer, etc there are also 2 handpumps on the bar which will be selling Real Ale although this wasn't on as we went to press as things were still getting sorted out. There is also an extensive range of bottled beers and the food is of the traditional German variety. The stage at the rear is set up for a house Oompah Band who will provide the entertainment and the seating is set out like a proper German beer hall.

#### Figment Beer Stall in the Market Hall

A new stall has opened in Derby Market Hall stocking over 150 different beers from around the world, gift packs and glasses too. They are on the ground floor in unit 6. They usually open 0930-1445 Tues-Weds, and 0930-1700 Thurs-Sat.

### **The Berlin Beer Adventure**

erlin, a great city, and a great place ofor a Derby CAMRA beer adventure. Eighteen of us visited for four nights in early August last year, and a very welcoming and enjoyable place it proved to be. If 18 sounds like a gang of uncouth Brits, don't worry. We were split between different flights and hotels, and, during the day, divided into different groups, depending on interests: some sought the cultural and the historical; for others, the four-day mission was to seek out new beers and microbreweries; for most, a mixture of all those things. But, in the evenings, we all converged on the main objective of the trip - the Berlin Beer Festival. More on that later!

I had been to Berlin twice before, and have still scarcely scratched the surface of all it has to offer. On the first day, the group I was in visited the magnificent Sans Souci palace in nearby Potsdam, followed by a late lunch in the Meierei im Neuen Garten (Dairy in the New Garden), which brews its own (excellent) beers and has a terrace with a lovely view over the Jungfernsee (lake) – best seen over a plate of Berliner Boulette mit Kartoffel-Gurken Salat. On subsequent days we opted to visit some of the preserved sections of the Berlin wall, and other reminders of Berlin's 20th century history. Sad in parts, yes, but uplifting at the same time; Germany has struck a good balance, the past is remembered and preserved; not to be forgotten, but gone.

Other groups hit the heights, ascending the former Soviet television tower at Alexanderplatz, at 386m high the tallest building in Germany. Clearly immune to vertigo, they also ascended into the famous dome of the Bundestag building designed by Norman Foster, of 'The Gherkin' fame. No doubt exhausted by all the ascents and descents, they later opted for a river trip on the Spree.

Never mind the confines of the Derby Market Place, the Berlin Beer Festival stretched for 1.5 km down Karl Marx Allee (no prizes for guessing that this magnificent broad boulevard was once in East Berlin). Individual beer stalls, food outlets and bands were spread down one side of this dual carriageway over the whole distance (wisely, it was more or less





closed to traffic). So, how do you find the rest of the group? Simple, you text one of them to ask the number of the lamppost nearest to where they are sitting, and which of the three U-Bahn stations down the length of the festival is nearest to that lamppost. Attaching numbers to lampposts specially for the festival – excellent idea!

The festival is international, so in addition to a huge range of German beers from all over the country, there were some that we did not go there to try - Stella Artois or Kilkenny anybody? And we were not there for Old Speckled Hen or Thornbridge either. But there was an overwhelming choice of good German beers, a wide range of tasty foods to soak them up, and a great atmosphere of beer-lovers enjoying beer.

At this point I should perhaps admit that, although I like a great many German beers, I do find many of the well-know traditional brews, are a little bland for my taste. But I was hugely impressed by the microbrewery beers that we found. For me, pride of place goes to BRLO (Brlo is the original Slavic name for Berlin) a craft brewery with 16 brews on tap. The six I tried (well five of these were small measures on a tasting board) were excellent, and so was the food. We spent a golden afternoon there – sunshine, good company, good beer.





# The Winter Ale Trail is back - and it's bigger than ever!

Following the success of the first Derby and Amber Valley CAMRA Winter Ale Trail, which ran during January and February 2017, we have decided to run the event again, this time including pubs from the Mansfield and Ashfield CAMRA area, a most welcome addition. The 2018 Trail will thus be called "Amber Valley, Derby and Mansfield and Ashfield Winter Ale Trail", and the pubs taking part can be seen on the grid included in this magazine. The total number of pubs taking part this year is 69, including last years' winners from Derby, the Alexandra Hotel, and Amber Valley champions the Talbot at Ripley. We are sure that both will be trying very hard to retain to their titles, and we are equally sure that they will face stiff competition to do so.

As we did last year, we are inviting you, the public, to help us decide which pubs will take the honours this time. Whether you are a member of CAMRA or not, you can take part in the voting. What we would like you to do is visit at least 3 pubs, and preferably a lot more, in any or all 3 of the Branch areas and vote for your **top 3 pubs** in each one. You don't have to visit all the areas taking part to vote as there are individual winners in each one. **The top pub will receive 5 points,**2nd 3 points and 3rd 1 point. You can also let us know what your favourite beer is on the Trail - while this won't influence the result, the brewers will be happy to know about it! Once the Trail ends the points will be added up and the winners announced at Derby Winter Ales Festival, as well as on the Trail Facebook page, the winners having already been informed. Winning pubs in each Branch area will receive a CAMRA certificate signifying their achievement.

As for how to vote, there are four ways that this can be done. We have a dedicated email address for the Trail, amv\_derwintertrail2018@email.com, a Facebook page DERAMVWintertrail2018, a Twitter account ADMAWinterAleTrail2018,

or by text to 07982 943 944. Whichever way you choose to vote, please include your name, your top 3 pubs from all the Branch areas you've visited and your favourite beer from the entire Trail when doing so. As there are bound to be some great beers available on the Trail, if you want to nominate a top 3, that would be fine.

As we did last year we are offering some free ale at the **Derby Winter Ales Festival**, which begins on Wednesday February 21st, a few days after the Trail ends. As the Trail is much bigger than last time, to qualify for a free pint at least 20 pubs must be visited in either Derby, where there are 28 participants, or Amber Valley, from which 27 pubs are taking part, or all 14 Mansfield and Ashfield pubs. To enjoy 2 free pints, you need to visit 20 pubs from both Derby and Amber Valley, or 20 from one of those plus all the Mansfield and Ashfield pubs, quite a challenge, so are you up for it? There will be a Trail card included in Derby Drinker, and each pub will receive stickers to attach to it. Bring your card with the appropriate number of stickers to the Membership desk at Derby Winter Ale Festival to claim your beer. If anyone manages to get to all 69 pubs on the Trail, 3 pints would be the most appropriate reward for such an achievement.

All the pubs on the Trail are either on or in close proximity to public transport routes, details of which can be found by visiting CAMRA's What Pub site. There may also be organised mini bus trips in various areas, but as these have not yet been finalised any details will appear on the Trail Facebook or Twitter pages, along with booking information should that be required.

So, enjoy the Trail, enjoy the ales, and let us know who your favourite pubs are, as well as your favourite beers, we look forward to hearing from you!



Also ratified at our November meeting was the shortlist for our Pub of the Year 2018. The six candidates are:-



#### **Pub News**

There has been a fair amount of activity in pubs across our area in the last few weeks, as follows:-

- 1) The Red Lion at Kniveton has reopened after a two week closure for refurbishment. A wider range of ales is promised.
- Ye Olde Vaults in Ashbourne has undergone a major refit and relaunch as a sports bar. The two real ales offered are Doombar and Timothy Taylor's Landlord.
- 3) The Yeaveley Arms at Yeaveley has reopened after a closure of some four years and the threat of redevelopment into housing. A major refit has now been completed and it reopened for business on 6th November, with a full food menu promised for early December. We hope to be able to hold a branch meeting there early in the New Year.
- 4) After reopening with new management early in November, The Royal Oak at Hanging Bridge has unexpectedly returned to the old management team already.
- 5) The Coach & Horses in Ashbourne has new management in place again after a succession of short-term regimes. We wish the new team well.
- 6) The Black Horse at Dalbury Lees is due to re-open as we go to press it is being described as a small boutique hotel with bar facilities. The owners have previously taken on and reopened or renovated pubs local to us at the Cock at Muggington, The Three Horseshoes at Long Lane (now just "The Horseshoes") and are about to start work on The Bluebell at Kirk Langley, which is currently open as normal.

#### Sheffield's Real Heritage Pubs: Pub Interiors of Historic Interest

This new publication, the first Campaign for Real Ale (CAMRA) book about Heritage Pubs in Sheffield, is available as a free download. Edited by Sheffield and District CAMRA, Pub Heritage Officer, Dave Pickersgill, this ground-breaking document is the first attempt to create a snapshot of the Sheffield Pub Heritage picture.

Paul Ainsworth, Chair of the CAMRA National Pub Heritage Group: "Over the past 25 years, CAMRA has developed its

national and regional inventories of historic pub interiors. These highlight the crème de la crème of interiors which have either escaped much alteration for many years or contain features of exceptional interest. We have, though, been aware that below these top tiers can be found a host of interiors which, whilst much changed, still offer a great deal worth seeing. The pioneering work carried out in Sheffield to locate and record these has been an inspiring exercise. It enables compilation of this publication portraying the rich tapestry of Sheffield's pubs from the important to those where what remains, may be fragments, is nevertheless to be cherished. A bonus, of course, is that many of these pubs sell great real ale. We hope this guide is the first of many."

Included in the 81 pages are over 30,000 words, over 300 images and detailed comment on all the 22 Sheffield pubs listed on the CAMRA Pub Heritage website. Also documented are both local pubs with some historical interest and many fragments of our historical brewery and pub heritage.


#### THE ROWDITCH - A CELEBRATION

# KIMBERLEY BREWERY: Gone But Not Forgotten

Greene King's take-over of Hardy's and Hanson's (Kimberley) brewery in 2006 was bitterly opposed by CAMRA who rightly feared the loss of local beers and many redundancies.

Hanson's and Hardy's were two independent breweries founded in the Nottinghamshire town of Kimberley, on the same street in the mid 19thC. They merged in 1930 and, from 1932, all brewing was concentrated at Hardy's but it wasn't until 1972 that the Hardy's and Hanson's title was adopted. Their tied estate of 230 pubs stretched from the East Midlands to the Lincolnshire coast and the first CAMRA Good Beer Guide in 1974 listed 3 Kimberley houses in Crich alone.

Kimberley beer was popular in Derby, and it had a strong presence in the railway station area with, at various times in the











20thC, the Brunswick, the George, and the Rutland Arms, Carrington Street, (pictured before demolition) all tied houses. In the late 1970s you could buy a 4p platform ticket on the railway station and sample a pint of hand-pulled Kimberley in the buffet bar. Further Kimberley houses that latterly succumbed to the wrecking ball included the Anglers Arms, Nottingham Road, Spondon, (pictured) and the Shaftesbury, Shaftesbury Street, which boasted a superb tiled frontage. Another Kimberley pub of note was the Furnace on Duke Street, which, between 1967 and 2007, had just two licensees, Ray Watson and John Barnes. One of Derby's most characterful Kimberlev houses was the Globe. Sacheveral Street, a cosy 3 roomer with two




Shrovetide footballs suspended from the ceiling, and its last licensee was Vera May Brown whose photograph we've reproduced courtesy of Martin Pickard. Sadly, the Globe was demolished in 1979, much to the chagrin of Kimberley devotees, and a mosque now stands on the site. Mind you, the last night was memorable with Derby CAMRA's Pub Preservation Officer, the late Ivor Clissold, reportedly leaving as the sun was rising!

In 1981, Prince Charles opened a big extension at the brewery but, as frequently happens when breweries increase production, quality took a hit. It may have been Ind Coope Draught Burton Ale winning the CAMRA Champion Beer of Britain award in 1990 that inspired







Kimberley to launch Classic, a similarly strong, pale beer in October of the same year. The early 1990s saw the brewery in acquisitive mode, buying around 50 pubs including the famous Trip to Jerusalem, hewn out of Nottingham castle rock, which had been in the hands of the Ward family for a century. Later, the Bass brewery tap, the classic Cooper's Tavern, Burton on Trent, became their property too, as the Big Six breweries shed thousands of tied houses in the wake of the 1989 Beer Orders Act which has profoundly changed the nation's pub and brewing landscape.

The early years of the new millennium witnessed a nod to CAMRA's influence, when a new beer was brewed each month under the Cellarman's Cask banner, an innovation aimed at discerning drinkers searching for more choice. These special one-off brews augmented the existing Mild

Derby CAMRA Brewery Trip 2002


and Bitter which was always sweeter than its Nottingham counterparts, Home and Shipstone.

Derby CAMRA had a mutually beneficial relationship with Kimberley aided by the brewery's Public Relations' man, the affable Alan Shepherd, who would later found Bespoke Inns. Kimberley was one of the main sponsors of Derby's first winter beer festival in the Darwin Suite of the Assembly Rooms (pictured) in 2002, and one of our brewery tours is captured here in the same year.

At the end of 2006, Greene King wielded the axe with alarming alacrity, stripping Kimberley of its brewing heritage, and now, more than a decade on, the town's most imposing structure still awaits conversion. Sadly, the only real positive that emerged from the Greene King

takeover was the creation of LocAle by Nottingham CAMRA, a scheme promoting locally brewed beer, which has been rolled out nationally.

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

Julius Wilhelm Thalmann died in November. He was born in München (Munich) in 1926 and escaped the Holocaust on one of the last Kindertransport trains out of Germany in 1939. He studied at Art College where he met his future wife, and worked as a designer. Together they



had five children. The range of his interests was immense covering politics, art, theatre, music and film as well as literature, cycling, motoring and motor cycling. He was still doing the latter in his eighties. In 1960 he drove the family the width of Canada from Vancouver to the East Coast. He enjoyed good food, wine and beer. Though permanently active he found time to work at numerous CAMRA Beer Festivals in Derby and became a very well-known volunteer and probably our oldest one. The music played at the funeral ranged from Schubert to Dave Brubeck.
