





## No. 189 - A new destination for Real Ale in Allestree

At the beginning of August Matt Willers received the keys for a beauty salon sandwiched between the Co-op and Woodlands Church on Blenheim Drive, Allestree, and set about transforming it into a fresh-faced, lively location aimed for people with a love of great beer.

Whether that be the Craft variety, Belgium or Scottish Lagers, or a time-stood favourite pint of Real Ale, then he hopes to have something for everyone. They'll have five fresh ales each week and three lagers plus a huge selection of bottles and a great selection of Wines and Gins. For those not drinking, you won't find a J2O or Britvic55 but a fine selection of healthy and great tasting alternatives, having spent the last year trying to find non-alcoholic drinks for his

pregnant wife. It is hoped to be open towards the end of September but you can follow progress in the meantime on Facebook and Instagram @189allestree



### Blue Monkey is 10

The brewing trade in the UK has seen some changes over the years, but it's certainly a growth industry nowadays. It seems that there is a new Brewery starting somewhere in the country almost every week and, while some don't last too long, there are many that survive and thrive. One of these is the Blue Monkey Brewery, now based in Giltbrook having started life in Ilkeston.

It all began for Blue Monkey when John Hickling and his nephew Trevor Vickers began brewing in 2008, and the beers produced were so good that just about everyone who tasted them went back for more. It wasn't long before demand dictated a move, and in 2010 they moved to a purpose-built facility in Giltbrook, where they still are and now produce up to 20,000 pints of beer per week – so demand is certainly satisfied now! John moved on in 2013, leaving Trevor in charge, but progress has continued. As well as continuing to produce quality ales, including the very popular Infinity, BG Sips, Guerrilla and several more, they now own four pubs. These are situated in Nottingham, Arnold, Loughborough and Newark, and all are called the Organ Grinder. There is also a Blue Monkey Mobile Bar for hire.

This year Blue Monkey, now a well-established Brewery, celebrates its 10th Birthday, and I know that drinkers throughout the UK will wish them many happy returns. To celebrate, Beer Festivals were held at some or all of the pubs over the August Bank Holiday Weekend with a special beer, I'm 10, being brewed for the occasion. There was also a coach around all four pubs with guests receiving a free bottle of 10th Birthday Beer, a T-shirt and a Birthday Cake.

Blue Monkey's 10th Birthday celebrations were definitely worth joining in with, so happy birthday to the Brewery, and we all look forward to the next milestone in 2028!

It seemed strange not having a Derby
Summer Festival this year; that week in early
July is always pencilled in early and people
have certainly missed it. Still, there is every
chance that it will be back next year, raring to
go after a year off. Of course, before that comes
the Derby Winter Festival at the Roundhouse, a
welcome break from the winter with 40 to 50
ciders. But before that is Amber Valley Festival
at Strutts Community Centre from 27th to 30th
September with a cider bar which we hope will
have something to suit all cider drinkers.

Expect local ciders from Sisson & Smith (current East Midlands champion cider), Three Cats, and from North Derbyshire Woodthorpe Hall Ruby Suzie, a bit strong for some at 10.2% but always popular. Our travels into Somerset will take in Hecks (Browns Apple), Sheppys and Westcroft Janet's Jungle Juice. I know how much some of you enjoy the speciality ciders these days so we will have Rhubarb and Gin & Tonic from Snailsbank. Also from Herefordshire we will have specific apple variety cider from two classic cider makers, Gwatkins (Stoke Red) and Ross Cider & Perry Co. (Major and Ellis). Perry is struggling these

days and is hardly ever seen in pubs; we will have two Herefordshire perries from Newton Court and Ross. That will do for tasters. Entry to the festival is free for CAMRA members on Thursday, Friday afternoon and Saturday afternoon.

Looking a bit further ahead, Amber Valley will again be running a cider pub of the year competition, with nominations in October and judging in November (any CAMRA member is welcome to judge). Last year's competition resulted in a win for the Talbot at Ripley with Angel's Bar, Belper, being the runner up. The winner progresses to the East Midlands round to Cider Pub of the Year. I'm sure we will have a keenly fought competition this year.

I don't know if you visited any of the pubs on Nottingham Branch's recently completed cider saunter. I'm not a regular visitor to central Nottingham, but this certainly made it worthwhile. Top marks for me went to BeerHeadZ by the station for their Charnwood Dabinett: just a touch of sweetness and the temperature spot on (and it was a very hot day). Also excellent was the Organ Grinder at Canning Circus with Bad Apple Scrumpy Wasp, a proper cider with some

bite and a long aftertaste. Very good too was the King Billy at Sneinton with Blue Barrel Perry, smooth and refreshing. It's always good to see a pub serving perry. For a top-up on the way back I called at the Draycott Tap House. This is a regular cider outlet. I tried the Thirsty Farmer medium; a cider with a slight sparkle and plenty of flavour, a good end to the day.

It looks as though Derby Branch will be running a cider saunter in October and there are certainly plenty of good cider outlets in Derby these days. At the Furnace, as well as the ubiquitous fruit ciders you can find regular classic ciders. Last time it was Janet's Jungle Juice from Westcroft in Somerset. The Smithfield also has a decent range: Black Dragon from Gwynt y Ddraig in Glamorgan was on recently. Probably the biggest selection of ciders is at the Brunswick with a list of sixteen, almost a permanent mini cider festival. Last time in there I sampled the Farmer's Fear, medium dry. Carry on enjoying the summer, more hot weather please, and continue to support Real Cider in our pubs.

#### **Pub News**

The Blue Bell at Tissington went on the market in late July, as Greene King put it up for sale at offers in excess of £395,000. At the time of going to press, no public information on potential buyers was available.

**The Cock at Clifton** is now being marketed for lease as a going concern after its closure in May.

The Green Man is scheduled to open in late September and Branch members will be very keen to support the re-opening of this iconic pub. We intend holding a Branch Meeting there as soon as is practical.

The latest addition to the beer-drinking scene in Ashbourne, Maison du Biere, opened its doors on July 20th. It comprises of a bottle shop with over 400 beers and ciders at the front, and a bar and seating at the rear with 10 craft keg lines. No draught real ale is available, but the vast bottle range includes many examples of RAIB and they also offer 9-pint minipins from many local breweries. You can select any bottle off the shelves and drink it on the spot, for a 20p corkage charge which they will donate to local charities. We as a Branch wholeheartedly support Matt & Jo in their venture and will be holding a Branch Meeting there in the very near future - see diary.

### The TopBeer Bottle and Can Review



This is the right time for us to come out and tell everyone "We love canned beer as much as bottled!" It is best to be open about these things as there is still some prejudice about. We say "Don't knock it until you have tried it" and we think that the canned beer in this review is the one to turn the hardest of hearts.

Since the last edition went public I have been asked if the backdrop to the pictures is a strip off my bedroom wall. I wish it were but, alas, no. However I can confirm that every bottle top belongs to a beer that has been tenderly despatched into a beer glass for the delectation of the TopBeer reviewers. I suppose that bottled beers do have one advantage over canned.

Albion Classic EPA 3.9%, Burton Town **Brewery from Burton Town Brewery Tap for** £3.50 per 500ml

Though labelled as a classic EPA, when poured in the glass, the aroma is more like a traditonal Best Bitter bolstered by the faint wisp of rum that belies its low alcohol strength. There is a slight haze to this unfined and unfiltered beer which lightens the colour, however the tones are stll darker than expected. The flavours are well-balanced with the sweet honied Goldings matching the earthier Fuggles and the subtle aftertaste of

malt that lingers on. A refreshing and easy drinking beer which is not gassy, suiting the hot dry summer days we have been enjoying.

Please note that when I bought this bottle, afer a session tasting the range available at the Tap, BTB appologised for the problems they were having in procuring labels. Their "glass in hand" logo and the Albion label can be seen on their website at burton.town/



AEgir IPA 6.5%, AEgir Bryggeri (Flam, Norway) from Co-op at £1.99 per 330ml This deep amber-coloured beer gives of the fragrance of peach and melon with just a hint of rose on the nose. The flavours of luxuriant Persian spices are what come to mind when the beer first coats the tongue before the alcohol heat begins to burn through. There were hints of many fruits and spices on the tongue too ephemeral to capture here. This beer demands time. Your taste buds will tell you so at every sip. Finally, a pause before the

next mouthful will allow the lingering aftertaste of boozy grapefruits to flter through. Perhaps AEgir is the Norwegian word for "serious drinking."



Samphire Stout 4.5%, Fox Brewery (Heacham) from The Real Ale Shop (therealaleshop.co.uk) at £3.00 per 500ml When poured, this samphire-infused bottleconditioned beer is as dark as the black marshland soil that the samphire is cultivated in. The salty aroma of samphire that meets the nose is reminiscent of a seaside holiday harbour. Balancing this savoury smell is the sweet tang of liquorice, rather like the little "Black Jack" sweets. The explosion of bubbles that initially overpowers the taste buds quickly fades to bring forth the true strength of the slightly salty samphire favours with the sweetness of treacle - a combination which works counter-intuitively in the way that

salted caramel does. As all the other favours fade, samphire hangs on the tongue to take the final bow at the curtain call. Despite this unusual ingredient it is still overwhelmingly a classic stout in character. If you have never tasted samphire we would recommend buying a pack which is now available in most supermarkets.



Spill the Beans Coffee Porter 4.4%, Brains (Cardiff) from Aldi Stores at £0.99 per 330ml This is a very dark brown coffee-coloured porter. It has a predominantly sweet aroma that initially overpowers the olfactory senses, rather like the moment you open a packet of icing sugar and inhale the fine powder. A smell of coffee-flavoured fudge and burnt crème brulee rises off the light brown head. In the mouth the taste is again overwhelmingly sweet with the same flavours as the aroma. It is like a visit to an oldfashioned sweet shop. The aftertaste is fleeting, shorter than the half-life of Berylium-8, so no lingering enjoyment here but none the less a drinkable beer if you are not expecting the sinister darkness and

potent alcohol of a porter.

### Happy 1st Birthday

he Dog & Moon Free House on Sadler Gate celebrated its first birthday party on August Bank Holiday holding a three day music, beer & cider festival.

It seems like only yesterday that the Shakespeare was gutted, the cellar transformed and the atmosphere renewed and invigorated. Under new ownership, the days of underage drinking, dodgy DJs and drugs are gone and in are quality local live musicians, independent breweries, distilleries and pretty good artisan coffee too.

Real Ale is served here from four rotational hand pumps but not beers you're likely to see anywhere else. Independent, small-scale craft breweries dominate the cask ale scene here with a range of interesting flavours and styles represented throughout the week. A selection of Real Ciders is also available,

some of which are locally produced.

Live music events are held throughout the week. This includes Musical Bingo (where a musician plays songs instead of reading numbers, and there are free cheeseboards for all participants!), Musician Showcases, Open Mics and Sunday Night Jam Sessions. All of these exciting community events are well attended and bring an incredible atmosphere and dynamic to Sadler Gate.

The Dog & Moon has certainly put the old watering hole firmly back in Derby's drinking and Real Ale scene once more and licensees Katie & Mark must be given great credit for this. So why not pop in and check it out for yourself? The opening hours are: Closed Mon, 12-12 Tue-Thu, 12-1.30am Fri-Sat, 12-12 Sun. And you can catch up with their latest events on both Facebook and Instagram.







#### Burton & South Derbyshire Brewery News

#### **Blythe Brewery**

Information has indicated that two new beers are now in production: Golden Rush, a hoppy golden ale at 4.6%, and Dark Horse, a full-bodied stout at 4.7%.

#### **Burton Old Cottage Brewing Company**

Cask ales currently being produced: Oak Ale, Halcyon Daze, Dual Diamond and Just So Stout. Arctic Ale is to be revived in the near future. The brewery has now taken over the Weighbridge Inn micropub in the Grain Warehouse Yard, off Derby Street, Burton, where they will be selling their own beers plus guest ales, wines and spirits, including a 'gin of the week'. Currently they are liaising with other brewers, locally and further afield, to do swaps.

#### **Heritage Brewery**

Sales of Heritage beers are very encouraging with an increase of 40% over the corresponding period last year. Special brews are being added to the core range. Most of the Bill Tidy pump clip cartoon series are popular, Fireside Ale has now been brewed for over six months, and Sole Survivor has also been re-brewed. Massey's Original Mild, initially brewed for a CAMRA beer festival, is now available all year. A small fermenter has been added to the equipment to facilitate smaller brews and beer for bottling.

#### **Quartz Brewery**

Trade is going well and the contact with Central Co-op has now been extended to the Co-op Group.

#### **Tollgate Brewery**

There have been no changes to the basic range of 12-month and seasonal beers. A special beer, Brew 500 (5.2%; lager-style), was produced in April to mark the 500th gyle since Pat & Quentin Brearley bought the brewery in 2011. With the Citra hop becoming more widely available again, Viking Gold (4.3% Golden Ale) has recently been resurrected after a 2½ year hiatus; the first slightly experimental brew was sold as Angry Viking, and Viking Gold was marketed as To Hop and to Hold in the brewery's pubs over the Royal Wedding weekend. The brewery's Town Street Tap micropub, Duffield, is Derby Branch's Country Pub of the Year 2018.

#### **Pub News**

The Dog in Burton has won the award of Runner-up Staffordshire Pub of the Year 2018. Presentation to be organised on a date TBA.

The Beacon on Tutbury Road, Burton, which closed unexpectedly in April, had been reported to be re-opening by the end of June. The pub owned by Star Pubs and Bars (Heineken) has still not re-opened (by the end of July).

The Lamb Inn on Main Street, Newhall, has had a £50,000+ refurbishment carried out by Marston's and reopened on Saturday 28th July.

The Foresters in Yoxall has undergone a £45,000 refurbishment financed by the private owners and has recently reopened. It is a traditional Country Pub and Restaurant.


The Crown in Yoxall opened on 10th August as an Italian themed restaurant.

# Amber Valley CAMRA Celebrates its 10th Anniversary











Ten years ago, on 18th September 2008, 42 CAMRA members met at the George, Lowes Hill, Ripley, to form the Amber Valley Branch of CAMRA, initially as a sub-branch of Derby. Later this September, our annual beer festival will be held at Strutt's on Derby Road, Belper, and we thought this would be an opportune moment to take a whistlestop tour of the pubs in this World Heritage town.

Closest to Strutt's is The Tavern, Derby Road, where a central, timber-faced bar with glazed frieze greets you upon entering and scrubtopped tables make for a traditional feel. When I called, Howard Town Monk's Gold, Marston's EPA and Pedigree were the beers of choice with younger drinkers catered for with a pool table to the rear. This is one of the many pubs in town which has made the most of its generous garden, reached via an attractive garden room. Turn right at "Morrison's" island onto New Road and then right again into Brookside and the stone-built Old King's Head soon hoves into view in this quiet residential backwater. Bev Boxall is the landlady and she has strong ties here as three generations of her family have lived at the pub. A cosy front bar and bigger back room serve well-kept Wainwright, Pedigree and Wychwood Hobgoblin Gold. Upstairs, there are huge function rooms where legendary Northern Soul DJ, Hector Heathcote, performed in July, whilst outside there's a skittles alley and colourful floral displays.

Carry on up New Road to the **Black Swan** which is entered via the seating area on the Market Place. An interesting, irregularly shaped interior with a side-snug features a blackboard displaying an enticing culinary menu. A rotating guest beer policy saw Lincoln Green Marion, Falstaff Phoenix and





Wychwood Hobgoblin Gold vying for attention. Cheek by jowl with the Swan is the two roomed Cross Keys, rescued from oblivion by Bateman's brewery and the Sinclair family at the start of the new millennium. The Sinclairs have moved to pastures new but Bateman's beers remain together with Draught Bass and a house beer, Golden Cross Keys. Lincolnshire Cheeky Imp was guesting when I called. Discreetly tucked away in a corner of the Market Place is the Good Beer Guide-listed Angels micropub offering many changing real ales and a good choice of traditional cider. Steve Cresswell, who brought the Honey Pot bar to Ripley, has his daughter, Katie, running Angels which originally was the stables to Belper's only thatched pub, the Angel Inn. Above the Market Place on High Pavement is the Nags Head where Mr Clayton served home brewed beer until 1971, before Mansfield Brewery acquired the premises. A large knockedthrough interior has Brewer's Tudor prominent, whilst outside to the rear, is a garden in which to enjoy a pint from the Marston's stable of breweries.

Up the High Street to the Grapes, surrounded on two sides by ballustraded decked areas, but on a blisteringly hot day I took refuge in the cool TV alley requisitioned from the pub's skittle alley during the World Cup. The central servery divides a U-shaped bar with cosy corners. On offer were Courage Directors, Banks Sunbeam, Wainwright and Pedigree. Cross the road and at the far end of Penn Street on Chesterfield Road is the unspoilt Queen's Head featured in CAMRA's book Real Heritage Pubs of the Midlands. Three rooms coalesce around the bar which had beers from breweries in locations as diverse as Cornwall and Edinburgh in the shape of St Austell Tribute and Caledonian Deuchars, which were competing with Wadworth 6X and the more familiar Draught Bass. Mention must be made of the terrace with far-reaching views over the town. Next door is the wedge-shaped Thorn Tree run by mother and daughter team, April Elliott and Amber-Rose whose tutelage under Paul Carroll (ex-Arkwright's) has stood them in good stead. They had a most impressive range of beers when I called: the cheerfully named Anarchy Brew Co Urban Assault (from Northumberland), Shiny New World, Castle









Rock Juniper Mild and Draught Bass straight from the cask. Live music is popular here and the front and back rooms are connected by by a short flight of steps. Down the hill and turn right into King Street where above street level is the **Green House** entered via a sun trap patio overlooking the Memorial Gardens. A spacious split-level interior had many diners taking advantage of food offers whist those seeking alcoholic sustenance could choose from Golden Boot from the Repton brewery, Abbot, Doom Bar and the almost ubiquitous Pedigree.

Further down King Street is the aptly named Railway, formerly a Home Brewery (Nottingham) house and now serving a decent pint of Theakston Best Bitter. The nearest pub to Belper's railway station has a spacious interior with a pool table and there's seating out at the back for fair weather drinking.

Turning into Campbell Street, we find the Good Beer Guide listed **Arkwright's Real Ale Bar**, part of what once was the Conservative Club. Paul Carroll, Arkwright's founder, has moved to the Coach and Horses, Horsley, but the quality beer offering he instigated is unchanged in a stylish room with some







interesting brewery memorabilia. On the A6, Bridge Street, is the white painted, residential **Lion Hotel,** integral to which is "the pub at the Lion" complete with pizzeria. Marston's beers had Thornbridge Jaipur for company, and aside from the salubrious surroundings is a courtyard and a further Astro-turfed area for fair weather drinking. Nearby is a former Home Brewery (Nottingham) house, the Brewer's Tudor fronted Riflemans Arms. A smartly refurbished, deep interior, is subdivided into different areas with a pool table to the rear, and Falstaff Bunsen and Pedigree competed for attention. The most has been made of the small patio at the back. The porticoed, Georgian George and Dragon across the road has long been a favoured haunt of Belper's discerning drinkers with a beer offering that rarely disappoints. On this occasion, Bristol Beer Factory Kiwi Bitter, Abbeydale Moonshine, accompanied Burton on Trent rivals Draught Bass and East Mill Bitter brewed by Tower. The rear side room is a shrine to the iconic Guinness advertising and well worth a look.

Pat White caused quite a stir in 1982 when he introduced topless barmaids to the grade 2-listed Duke of Devonshire, Bridge Street. Today, the Secret Dining Company run the premises now known as **The Devonshire**, and landlady, Denise Sage, has created décor that fuses traditional with modern with walls and surfaces in slate grey. The Secret Dining Company has revived a clutch of pubs hereabout and although dining is to the fore, beer aficionados will welcome a changing







range of beers that regularly features some of our better local breweries such as Shiny and Dancing Duck. And, outside at the back, there are two large patio areas in which to savour them.


We'll finish with the latest addition to the Belper beer scene, the **Pump It Up** micropub on Bridge Street. An intimate interior has two tiny rooms with photographs from days gone by of the premises' former commercial usage, together with Rams' team shots down the years. There's no shortage of choice here with Muirhouse Wolf, Blue Monkey Affinity, Thornbridge Lord Marples, Dancing Duck Abduction and a collaborative brew from Arbor and Shiny called Any Other Name, all available when I dropped in. Gwynt Black Dragon cider (7.2%abv) was the apple alternative and all of these had a uniform price of just £3 a pint.


I trawled Belper on two hot days in July, and my abiding memory will be of colourful floral displays, not just in the town, but also in so many well-tended pub gardens.

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### ACTION TAKEN AGAINST FOUR DERBY LICENCE-HOLDERS AS A BIG DECREASE OF DRUNKENNESS IN DERBY WAS REPORTED IN 1916

our licence-holders were reported to have been dealt with under powers granted to the police by the Defence of the Realm Act (DORA) that overall had reduced instances of drunkenness in Derby. The annual licensing meeting took place in February 1916 and received a report from the Chief Constable, H M Haywood. In it he outlined action that had been taken against four licence holders.

A previous issue of Derby Drinker told the story of the Castle Fields public house on Siddals Road. The licensee, Arthur White was fined £5 plus costs in 1916 for selling intoxicating liquor at 10.25pm. After a second offence, a closing order was made by competent military authority under DORA. The pub never re-opened and was eventually demolished for road widening.


Rowland Henry Allen of the Lyndhurst Refreshment Bar on Normanton Road had been caught selling intoxicating liquor during prohibited hours. Allen's crime was that he had missed the 9pm curfew for serving alcohol by 10 minutes and for this a 'closing order dated 1 March 1915 (was) made by competent military authority and Allen was also fined £2 plus costs. The bar re-opened in due course and was granted a full licence in 1951. It remains open today and is now known as the Lyndhurst Bar.

The Queen Adelaide beer house stood on Canal Street and its licensee, Arthur Collumbell, was fined £1 including costs in October 1915 for the lesser offence of 'Not keeping his licensed house closed at 4.15pm for the consumption of intoxicating liquor by a member of his Majesty's forces in contravention of an order made on 23 July 2015' by Colonel J A Reekes. Subsequently the Queen Adelaide was granted a full licence in 1950 before eventually closing in the mid-1960s.

Also in October 1915 the Windmill public house was subjected to police attention on the basis that licensee Frank Eyre had permitted drunkenness for which he was fined £5 including costs. It was noted that the licence had since been transferred to another individual. The Windmill itself closed eventually in the late 1920s.

The first two cases in particular demonstrate the strict action that was taken against licensed premises caught breaking the law during the First World War in the name of 'Defence of the Realm'.

Other cases brought before magistrates during the war years include the following cases outside of Derby reported in the Derby Mercury. First up was another licensee who was found guilty of selling beer



after the 9pm curfew. The offender on this occasion was Arthur Hanson of the Mundy Arms, Mackworth, who was prosecuted in October 1918.

Profiteering by selling beer above the fixed price was not allowed during the War and on 30th August 1918 the Mercury reported that Walter Buxton, licensee of

the Harrow Hotel, Ilkeston, had been found guilty of selling a pint of beer for 6 old pence, 50% above the legal limit of 4 old pence per pint. Buxton was fined £9 4s plus costs. John Kerry, landlord of the Prince of Wales on Bath Street, Ilkeston, appears to have been caught by a police 'sting' operation as he was caught selling a half pint of beer for two and a half old pence to Inspector Radford of Nottingham. As the legal price limit for a half pint was two old pence, Kerry was ordered to pay £6 4s.

Similar convictions were reported against James Fearn of Hodgkinson Hotel, Matlock Bath, and George Leigh, Red Lion, Matlock Green, on 13th September 1918.




