



DERBY CAMRA Pubs of the Year 2022

The Derby Branch of CAMRA has selected its Pubs of the Year for 2022:-

The City Pub of the Year is the Smithfield Alehouse on Meadow Road beating finalists the Alexandra Hotel and Furnace Inn to the title. The Country Pub of the Year is the Royal Oak in Ockbrook beating finalists the Spirit Vaults in Melbourne and Town Street Tap in Duffield to the title. And by virtue of having the highest overall mark the Smithfield Alehouse has also been crowned Derby CAMRA Pub of the Year 2022.

or an unprecedented fifth year on the trot the Smithfield Alehouse has managed to come out on top of the tree not only as the City winner but also as the Branch winner as well for the very first time in the history of Derby CAMRA.

Licensees Emily Bowler and partner Ben Miller only took on the running of the pub just over 5 years ago so to be crowned Pub of the Year for five successive years is indeed a major achievement in a City that has got so many good Real Ale pubs. Of course, Emily was no stranger to Real Ale pubs beforehand having worked in some fine establishments over the years: The Standing Order in Derby; Pattenmakers Arms in Duffield; Boat in Cromford; County & Station in Matlock Bath and Arkwrights in Belper but the lure of running her own pub brought her full circle back to Derby.

The Smithfield you have to say has always been a decent Real Ale pub but its fortunes have ebbed and flowed over the years just like the river it sits on but its current high tide is probably the best it's ever been with an ever-changing range of Real Ales & Ciders from near and far making it a must visit place where the ales turn over so guickly that within an hour of being there you might have 2 new ones on. And for fans of dark beers there is always at least one or two on. This coupled together with a great live music scene, Camra discount and being one of Derby's few riverbank pubs make it a destination place for all lovers of proper traditional pubs and great Real Ale. Of course being on the river is not without its problems as the pub has been completely flooded on several occasions during spells of bad weather so to come back from that and take the honours again is quite remarkable. Congratulations then to Emily and Ben on winning Derby CAMRA Pub of the Year not once, not twice, not three times, not four times but five years on the run.

Out in the Country the Royal Oak at Ockbrook retains the title it won last year and has indeed won on many occasions before. The pub which has been in the same family since the 1950's has featured in the Good Beer Guide more than any other pub in the Derby Branch Area. It has a selection of real ales and ciders on and holds regular Beer Festivals

throughout the year. Always worth a visit it is easily reached on the Littles No.9/9a bus route which runs from Derby to Ockbrook Monday-Saturday up to 5.05pm. Congratulations then to all of the team involved at the Royal Oak.

DERBY CAMRA Club of the Year 2022

The Derby Branch of CAMRA has selected its Club of the Year for 2022 with the Jubilee Club in Chaddesden taking the honours. Several Clubs throughout the area were visited but in a keenly fought contest the Jubilee came out on top beating finalists the



Victory Club in Allenton and the Liberal Club in Spondon to the title. The Club serves a selection of Real Ales and is reached from Derby on the Black Cat bus service which stops nearby. Congratulations then to all involved at the Jubilee Club for taking this year's title.

Mild Month

Every May CAMRA branches across the country celebrate 'Mild May', an initiative to celebrate and highlight the beer style Mild, which was recently under threat of extinction due to a drop in popularity. To help revive the Mild beer style, CAMRA branches encourage local pubs to have at least one Mild on the handpumps during the month of May, and some organise trips to pubs and breweries that embrace and support the beer style.

Mild is a beer style which developed in the late 18th and 19th centuries as drinkers started to demand a slightly sweeter and less aggressively hopped beer than Porter. Early Milds were much stronger than modern versions, which tend to fall into the 3% to 3.5% category, though a number of brewers are bringing strength back into style. Mild is usually dark brown in colour, due to the use of well-roasted malts or roasted barley. Look for a rich malty aroma and flavour, with hints of dark fruit, chocolate, coffee and caramel, with a gentle underpinning of hop bitterness.

So if your out and about during May keep an eye out for additional Milds on the pumps around the pubs in the Branch area and beyond. Also why not give the Nottingham Mild Trail a try as featured in the current Nottingham Drinker which is available to view on their website.

Annual Beer Census 2022

This year will see the return of the Annual Beer Census around the pubs of Derby after a few years delay. It will take place on **Friday 24th June** on 8 different routes around town starting about 7.30pm and finishing after 10pm in the Flowerpot. We welcome all comers on the trail particularly if you would like to be one of the crawl leaders. Every year we have managed to increase the number of Real Ales available around our pubs and become the Country's Real Ale Capital and we hope to do likewise this time. 

Branch Beer Festival

Finally after two years of cancelled festivals we are back on track with the 11th Amber Valley Beer & Cider Festival to be held from 30th June to 2nd July this year at the Belper Rugby Club, Derby Rd, Belper, Derbyshire DE56 1UU.

The festival has moved across the road from Strutt's School to Strutt's Field, previously the school's playing field, now occupied by the Belper Rugby Club, who have very kindly allowed us to use the field and club house for our festival.

The main festival will take place in a large marquee, complete with stage and dance floor. Around 90 beers, ciders & perry will be set up in the marquee, also craft beers, soft drinks, snacks etc. There will be a wide selection of beers of all types & styles from breweries near and far served at cellar temperature thanks to our excellent cooling system. The Club House bar will also be open serving the full range of drinks.

On Thursday there will be no music in the marquee and CAMRA members are admitted free on showing a current membership card. Open from noon to 11pm.

Friday is open from 12 noon to 5.30pm for the afternoon. Friday evening opens at 5.30pm to 11pm with entertainment from **Kelly's Heroes** followed by the **Modskas**. Tickets will be available for the evening sessions, and it is strongly advised that you buy tickets early to ensure admission, as numbers are limited. Tickets available at Ents24 Modskas 1st July. CAMRA members with evening tickets get a concession on admission in the form of a £3 beer token on showing their ticket and current CAMRA card.

Saturday is open from 12 noon to 5.30pm for the afternoon. Saturday evening opens at 5.30pm to 11pm with entertainment from Soul Stew Northern Soul & Motown Disco followed by the ever popular Rollin' Stoned tribute to the Rolling Stones. Again it is advisable to book tickets early to ensure admission. Tickets available at Ents24 Rollin' Stoned 2nd July. CAMRA members with evening tickets get a concession on admission in the form of a £5 beer token on showing their ticket and current CAMRA card.

There will be a range of meals and snacks available from the Club House and various stalls and vans on site including vegetarian, gluten free and vegan.

There is on-site parking for blue

badge holders and staff only, but plenty of free parking is available locally. Rail & Bus Stations only 5 minutes walk away.

Volunteers are required for set up, knock down, and bar work etc. We also require a festival treasurer and staffing officer. If you are interested, please do not hesitate to contact us at staffing@ambervalley.camra.org. uk or by phone Nigel Heathcote 07834 732 050.

Pub News

As some of my information may not be current, I would be pleased to hear of updates on the following:-

The **Bear** at Alderwasley is open for drinks Tuesday to Sunday; the temporary kitchen has limited opening times but the whole place is making progress.

The **Hurt Arms** at Ambergate has reopened after flood damage on 25th March.

The **Belper Tap** ceased trading in October and is still closed. It is rumoured that the Bang Café Bar may be relocating to here.

Chapters, a new bar is due to open in King Street, Belper during March/early April but will not sell cask ales, partial details have been entered on to Whatpub.

Pump It Up in Belper ceased trading on 6th March.

The **Talbot** in Belper is up for sale but is still trading.

Tylers in Belper is sometimes but not always open at weekends, CP has been in but it needs a proper survey. Sunday lunches now available.

The Canal at Bullbridge is not reopening until September 2022 due to major refurbishment and is now part of the local Moorwood Group.

The **Bulls Head** at Denby has reopened, needs a new survey.

The **Honey Pot** bar in Ripley is closed for refurbishment and when reopened will replace the currently open **Beehive** which will then become housing.

Tom Said in Ripley is now open on Tuesdays.

The **Devonshire Arms** at Somercotes is believed to be still closed awaiting new tenants.

The **Old Yew Tree** at South Wingfield – unclear whether this has reopened.

South East Derbys

Rural south east Derbyshire is an attractive area that Derby Drinker hasn't covered before so we're looking at what's on offer here, pubs-wise.

There's only one place to start and that's Green Lane, Ockbrook, where set back from the road is the venerable Royal Oak. Ever since 30th April 1953, the multi roomed village local has been in the same family and the Queen's Coronation in June of that year was broadcast to locals outside in the days when many didn't possess a TV. When Lew and Olive Wilson moved into the Offiler's (Derby) house all those years ago the rent was £1 a week and bitter and mild were served through handpumps. Two cottages stood in front which were subsequently demolished to make way for the car park as car ownership boomed. Lew and Olive bought the Oak in 1989 but, sadly, Lew passed away in 1994. Steve Hornbuckle had earlier married their daughter, Jean, and together with Jean's sister, Sally, they've continued to make this a destination pub for locals and visitors alike. Olive died a few years ago. Draught Bass is a staple here and with 3 changing guest beers and good fayre to sate one's appetite it isn't surprising that the Oak has featured in every CAMRA Good Beer Guide since 1977. Also, there have been more awards than you can shake a stick at, including East Midlands' Pub of the Year. Even that was eclipsed by last year's accolade of CAMRA's Golden Award which saw the white painted establishment in an elite group of just 32 UK pubs considered to have made a significant contribution to pub life during CAMRA's 50 years. A little further along Green Lane and set above the road is the Cross Keys

run by former local cricketer, lan Darlington, for the past dozen years.

An intimate interior features a

action in the wake of Brian Clough and Peter Taylor's resignations in 1973. Football fans are, indeed, kept entertained by the Sky Sports screens here. A cursory glance at the menu showed fresh stone-baked pizzas together with burgers, kebabs and halloumi wraps. On the bar were handpulls dispensing Oakham Citra, St Austell Proper Job, Pedigree and Doom Bar. Outside, a marquee has been erected on the astro-turf. In the shadow of All Saints parish church, sits the long, low slung, White Swan on Church Street. A deep, sub-divided public bar was buzzing when I called on a Sunday lunchtime when I was served a pint of Adnam's Ghost Ship by a friendly female member of staff. Also available were the strong Thornbridge Jaipur, Pedigree and Taylor's Golden Best, the latter making a pleasant change from Landlord which catapulted the Keighley, West Yorkshire brewery into the conscience of beer lovers nationwide. The White Swan promotes itself as a "Tapas Bar and Restaurant" and the lounge I sat in was certainly busy with diners. There's a lovely garden to enjoy at the rear when weather permits. As Derby Drinker went to press, a refurbishment was underway which should have been completed by the

Near the A52, on Victoria Avenue, is the Queen's Head, once run by former Rams' centre forward John O'Hare. This is essentially an open plan, quintessential family dining pub with multiple TV screens and a very large garden. Discerning beer drinkers haven't been forgotten, however, and I was pleased to see Abbeydale Daily Bread, Doom Bar, 2 Frothblowers (West Midlands) ales and a local beer, Shiny Disco Balls all vying for attention. I opted for a satisfying stout from Frothblowers as I reflected on the pub's successful beer festival back in August 2021. Not far from Ilkeston and adjacent to

time you read this.

hire Villages' Tour

Club, is the modernised Seven Oaks Inn, Low's Lane, Stanton. Several rooms have uniformly contemporary décor and pine is to the fore. This was another busy establishment, packed with diners although those seeking liquid sustenance hadn't been forgotten with Hobgoblin Gold, Pedigree, Doom Bar and Taylor's Landlord on draught. I tried the former which didn't disappoint. Behind the pub is a patio and a marquee containing a games room, ideal for keeping children occupied. Stanton Ironworks was a major employer employing up to 7,000 at its height but, sadly, the last pipe was cast in 2007. Ilkeston born actor Robert Lindsay started his career here before finding fame as an actor. Stanton Pre-cast (concrete) has, however, won a lucrative order for HS2 tunnel panels in the south east, and Verdant Regeneration has a planning application lodged with Erewash Borough Council to create 4,000 jobs on the 450-acre site.

In the middle of pretty Stanton by Dale village is the **Stanhope Arms**, clearly an inn of some antiquity. Upon entering, the low ceilinged, beamed local has been partially knocked through creating one room but retaining some intimacy, and seating includes cushioned, highbacked pews. The food offering has 1,2 and 3 course Sunday roasts and children's portions are served at ground floor level and upstairs. A 1956 newspaper cutting describes Stanton Ironworks as "one of the most successful in Europe". Dogs are welcome and much has been made of the outside areas which include a new split-level decking to the rear. The almost ubiquitous Doom Bar had a house beer for company -Stanhope Ale, and from Brighton, Laine's Breaker which I hadn't encountered hitherto. The car park is across the road.

Turning off into Dale Road, the extended, end of terrace **Chequers** soon hoves into view where Sue and lan Moon have been mine hosts for

fully twenty years. And they intend to be here for a while still. During the lockdowns the couple carried out improvements internally and externally and the whole looks impressive now. This isn't the first pub to have a heated outdoor area and in the current climate (pardon the pun) it's most welcome. The most has been made of a big site with caravan and camping spaces available for hire. The split-level interior has a quartet of real ales including Draught Bass and Oakham Citra, contrasting beers suiting different palates but I happen to like

Continuing along Dale Road, turn right at the end onto Woodpecker Hill and then sharp left into Moor Lane, where the ivy clad Carpenters' **Arms** awaits in historic Dale Abbey. Little remains of the 12thC Abbey except for a Chancel arch and masonry abutting an old cottage but this remains a fascinating settlement to explore. Grade 1 listed All Saints Church is extant and integral to it, once with direct doorway access, is the delicensed Blue Bell Inn. The Hollingworth family ran the Blue Bell before building the Carpenters' Arms in 1880. The Carpenters' is on a huge parcel of land with ample area for alfresco imbibing in fair weather. Inside the Carpenters', there's a wood panelled lounge replete with frieze and banquette seating, the likes of which have all but disappeared. Also, there's a cosy side lounge and a separate public bar. East Anglian beers, Adnam's Broadside and Greene King Abbot share bar space with a brace from Marston's of Burton on Trent - Pedigree and 61 Deep. Themed food lunchtimes and evenings complete the picture. We've come to the end of this


particular perambulation, and we hope Derby Drinker has shown why it's worthwhile to visit this part of south east Derbyshire.

Pentrich and South Wingfield Revolution Group **ALE TRAIL 2022 TRAIL CARD**

The Pentrich Revolution 4 Branches Ale Trail May 14th – June 11th

On the night of the 9th of June 1817, around 200 to 300 men set out from South Wingfield to march to Nottingham, all of them under the false impression that they were part of a revolt that would bring down the Government. Picking up more supporters along the route, the marchers got as far as Eastwood, where they were met by two magistrates accompanied by 20 well-armed men and officers of the 15th Light Dragoons. The marchers scattered, and not a shot was fired. Although the march itself began in South Wingfield, it was planned in Pentrich, and is thus known

as the Pentrich Revolution.

The Pentrich and South Wingfield Revolution Group was established in 2012 to bring attention to the 1817 Pentrich Revolution, an important although generally little-known historical event. More information on the Revolution can be found on their website (pentrichrevolution.org.uk).

The Trail below involves pubs across 4 different Camra Branch areas on or close to the route taken by the March, plus some in Derby where radicals met and sowed the seeds of the Pentrich Revolution, and in the vicinity of where the trials of the ringleaders

took place, beginning on the October 16th

It is run on similar lines to the Winter Ale Trail, however with a few slight differences. There are commemorative boards at several pubs and indoor displays in a few about the Revolution. There is also a Fish and Chip Restaurant, which has an information board. The Pentrich and South Wingfield Revolution Group have also put together a quiz based on the participating pubs (plus the chippy) with prizes for the winners. Further details of everything can be found below.





2022 Pub of the Year results for Burton and South Derbyshire

The winner of 2022 Pub of the Year is the Old Royal Oak in the Market Place, Burton. Was this a shock? To some, certainly! Beating all of the usual suspects was certainly some conquest. To others it was a just reward for the quality and variety of Ales in the newly refurbished premises. The pub is the Tap House for Fownes Brewery, Brierley Hill. It opened in July 2020, in a lull between lockdowns, not the easiest of times for pubs but well done Fownes for sticking with it! In the early days it was mainly

frequented by CAMRA members but slowly as restrictions eased in 2021 it became one of the must go to real ale pubs. This was quite a change as previously it had been a Bikers pub with live rock bands every weekend. Even in those days it sold up to 4 real ales but certainly wouldn't have scored so highly in the PotY criteria. The Manager. Michelle Geary said she was absolutely shocked at first as there are so many good pubs in Burton and had to ring one of her CAMRA contacts to confirm it! It is always pleasing to welcome a new winner, to join the ranks. It is probably the 1st time this Pub has won this award, certainly in my memory, does anyone know otherwise?



The Old Royal Oak, Market Place, Burton

The premises have quite a history, the front of the building being about 300 years old but the rear being closer to 400 years old. The building was once used as the Town Jail. It is stated on a Burton history site that the "manorial gaol" at the Royal Oak closed in the early 1830's. Apparently it wasn't that unusual to have "night cells" in those days!

In 2nd place was the 2020 (and de facto 2021) PotY winner the Devonshire Arms, Burton which through it's popularity is still reaping the rewards of the win. In 3rd place was the Weighbridge Inn which is the Tap House for Muirhouse Brewery in Ilkeston.

The South Derbyshire winner was the Colvile Arms, Lullington just ahead of the Brickmakers Arms in Newton Solney. In 2020 they shared the same position. The Colvile Arms will therefore be forwarded as our nomination for the next stage in the East Midlands Region, ie. for Derbyshire Pub-of-the-Year. The Colvile Arms is also our Country Pub-of-the-Year.







The Winter Ale Trail - another great event

After an enforced lay off in 2021, it was a pleasure to be able to welcome back the popular Winter Ale Trail this year. Unlike in previous years, the uncertainty surrounding possible further COVID restrictions meant that we didn't start organising the Trail until late November, but even so 79 pubs from 5 CAMRA Branches agreed to take part. Inn Focus: Hole in the Wall Regent Street, Long Eaton



ong Eaton's prosperity was based on the lace industry and it was here at Long Eaton United that England, Manchester United and Forest footballer, Garry Birtles, started his career.

The once popular speedway stadium did, however, close many moons ago. In recent years there have been some welcome new pub openings in Long Eaton such as York Chambers and Rowells Drinking Emporium. In neighbouring Sawley, Sawley Junction by the station, and the Lock Keeper's Rest have caught the attention of beer buffs but, as sometimes happens, older, more traditional premises can get overlooked. One such pub in the centre of Long Eaton is the Hole in the Wall, Regent Street which is distinguished by a highly attractive Dutch gable.

The town's discerning beer drinkers breathed a collective sigh of relief when it reopened in January after 14 months pandemic induced closure. Owner and licensee, Kevin Thompson, has been here since the 21st November 1986 so he's just about seen it all as far as the pub trade goes. This century, Kevin's pub has been often Good Beer Guide listed and it's not difficult to see why. Atop the bar were Nottingham Dreadnought and Centurion which vied for attention with a brace from Oakham – Citra and the strong Green Devil.





Myriad handpump clips attest to the array of guest beers served over the years and cider aficionados haven't been forgotten either, with Bottle Kicking Cider Company Scrambler, a traditional medium dry 6.8% abv available. The bar has a pool table whilst an elongated lounge has comfortable banquette seating and both rooms have limited wall space owing to a plethora of memorabilia and bric-a-brac.






Outside at the back there's a lovely area which catches the sun and skittles still is a popular pastime here. Three lodges are available for rental.
