The Winter Ale Trail Returns

After a successful return in 2022 following the 2021 lockdown, the Winter Ale Trail is back in 2023 and has expanded to 129 Pubs covering eight different



CAMRA Branches making it the biggest & best Ale Trail in the entire Country.

The Ale Trail was originally founded by Derby & Amber Valley CAMRA who have since been joined by Ashborne & District, Erewash Valley, Mansfield & Ashfield, Matlock & Dales, Nottingham and Uttoxeter & District CAMRA Branches. To see the full range of pubs across those areas take a look at the centre page pull-out Trail Card in this issue. The trail runs from Friday 13th January until Sunday **26th February** and involves visiting the pubs on the trail, drinking a pint or half in each pub and picking up a sticker from the bar staff to put on your trail card. 30 or more stickers will entitle you to a reward at either a forthcoming Derby, Amber Valley or Ashbourne CAMRA Beer Festival. The ones who have the most stickers will also receive a certificate from us. Also we will again invite drinkers to let us know their two best pubs on the trail in each Branch area which enables us to decide the winners and runners-up who will also receive certificates at future presentations (photos will appear in subsequent issues of Derby Drinker).

So there you have it, we hope you will take part as January & February are usually the most difficult time of year for pubs so it's great to support them by running the Winter Ale Trail and we hope you can get out & about over these Months to do your bit and perhaps visit pubs you have never been to along the way too. 


Christmas Social

Ye Olde Vaults, Ashbourne also has a new management in place, but the Coach and Horses in the town closed in mid-November at the expiry of the current tenancy. There does not appear to be an immediate succession as the pub remained closed into December.







Settle Down in a

t may be cold outside, but your energy bill may make you think twice about turning the heating up. Happily, some pubs hereabout have retained those small, enclosed areas known as snugs, or snuggeries, to give them their full name. Indeed, certain snugs have open fires which only add to the allure in winter, so where better to spend a couple of hours than in the cosy confines of a snug?

Derby's oldest city centre pub, the Dolphin, Queen Street, has a fine example which up until 1975 was the preserve of men only. At the beginning of the new millennium, licensee Terry Holmes, a larger than life figure, served up such delights as Cain's Mild and Caledonian Deuchars, duly winning Derby CAMRA Pub of the Year in 2002. Jim and Jo Harris succeeded Terry, expertly keeping the place in the limelight for the next twenty years. This year, Jason Weston, formerly of the historic Salutation, Nottingham, took the reins and serves up to seven real ales including a tasty house beer, Dolphin 1530, brewed by Nottingham Brewery. Food is back on the menu with a general knowledge quiz on Sunday and a music quiz on Tuesday to test the old grey matter.

The knocking through of buildings is often synonymous with a loss of character, but not at the Exeter Arms, Exeter Place. Extension into neighbouring dwellings has created a lot more space but intimacy remains the hallmark of this cracking corner house. For the past decade this has been a joint venture between Dancing Duck brewery and Martin Roper and Denise Sage. Cutting edge food and this Derby brewery's beer feature with the snug being on the left as you enter. The snug was captured in a brilliant illustration by the late Reg Newcombe and remains today, albeit with the high-backed pews lowered and a side window incorporated.

When our photograph of the Seven Stars Inn was taken, it was mooted that it could be removed and rebuilt elsewhere to facilitate the widening of King Street, in much the same way that the Red Lion was transferred from Stoke on Trent to Crich

National Tramway Museum. Cleverly, however, Derby City Council conjoined King Street to Garden Street by pitching Quaker Way through the pub's big backyard, negating the need for the Stars' costly removal. Built in 1680, the 1936 floor plans show a quite different front room configuration to that extant today. Up until the early 1960s, an on-site brewery was located in a rear room which now is attractively wood panelled, serving as a snug. Historically, it's highly likely that water was used for brewing from the well, still visible in the pub's middle room. Following Scottish and Newcastle's acquisition in 1962, the brewing equipment was sold to the Friary Hotel which brewed its own until the late 1960s. Happily, the Stars has made a welcome return to the latest Good Beer Guide with Marston's Pedigree vying for attention with two or three changing guests, and during clement weather the swish rear patio is a fine sun trap.

When the **Brunswick Inn**, Railway Terrace, reopened in 1987 to universal laudation, the room off the corridor to the left nearest the brewery established later hadn't been utilised. Today, however, it's my favourite room and as our photograph shows, it has high backed banquette seating, ceiling panels and integral wall cabinets displaying old brewery drinks trays and beer festival glasses from way back when. Take your pick from a large offering of real ale and traditional cider. Brewing has been part of business here since 1991 and half a dozen own brewed beers augment changing guests.

Perhaps uniquely, the Malt Shovel, Potter Street, Spondon, has not one, but two adjacent snugs. Longevity features strongly here, firstly in the pub itself which is an 18th century, Grade 2 structure; secondly in that the Spondon Friendly Society was based here from 1777 to 1927. This was a kind of local National Insurance scheme although I understand that male members were partial to a pint or three! Thirdly, Tony and Betty Woodyet ran the Malt between 1950 and 1985. It was, however, licensees Ken and Barbara Littleproud who saved the pub from

extinction in 1992, buying it from Bass who had threatened to close it owing to the necessity of costly repair work. Well worth seeking out then, not just for the Marston's beers, if you're in Spondon.

Green Lane, Ockbrook, is where we find the multi-roomed Royal Oak which is the epitome of a traditional village local. In the lounge, there's a lovely photograph of licensees, Lew and Olive Wilson, accompanied by Morris Dancers, and the couple provided TV viewing of Queen Elizabeth's Coronation in 1953 to villagers who may not have owned a television. Remarkably, 70 years later, the same licensee family intend to broadcast this historic event for King Charles's Coronation on 6th May. Expect to find Draught Bass sharing bar space with two ever changing guests, one being the enjoyable Peakstones' Milk Stout on my visit. Food is served at traditional meal times and is of the wholesome, non-microwaved variety. The Oak has been a perennial entry in the Good Beer Guide since 1977 with the Assembly Room hosting twice yearly beer festivals. A hundred members packed in here at Derby CAMRA's best attended Branch meeting in 1978.

The Holly Bush, Holly Bush Lane, Makeney, may be discreetly located but the enduring popularity of this stone-built pub remains undiminished. Come rain, hail or shine, folk flock to the National Inventory listed inn run by Chris Wilbraham, one of only a handful of licensees since WW2. Grade 2 listed and once a farmhouse on the Strutt Estate, the place positively oozes character, nowhere more so than in the snug behind a curved partition, glazed at the top. There's a doorway to the tiny bar with a strong Thornbridge presence, which is no bad thing, and I enjoyed their Ena Milk Stout. On a cold winter's day with the fire roaring, there's no better place to be than the Holly Bush especially as meals and snacks are available. On 24th November, the Derby Telegraph reported that a representative from the European Bar Guide had visited the Holly Bush, praising it and giving it a maximum score.

Perched high up on Chesterfield Road, Belper, is the town's best-preserved pub, the **Queen's Head**, incorporating a snug on the right with bench seating. Different rooms coalesce around the bar servery which dispenses a quartet of hand pulled ales. Musicians play here and Zetor in the Kailyard perform on February 14th – see website for gigs etc. In warmer weather, you can take advantage of the external back terrace with far reaching views of The Chevin.

The **Bell Inn**, Cromford, on the corner of Cromford Hill and North Street was built circa 1800 after the adjoining Richard Arkwright weavers' housing, which at that time was revolutionary in terms of the accommodation workers could expect. Arkwright paid his staff in tokens as there was no bank for miles around and these would be exchanged over the bar for beer. The snug is to the rear with a hatchway to the servery where Draught Bass and Oakham Citra can be sampled, sometimes with a guest beer. Thus, licensee Charlotte Hurt has ensured that the real ale is constantly turning over, ensuring its quality.

Over in Burton on Trent, on Cross Street, is the classic **Coopers Tavern** where the William Bass Meeting Room is a relatively recent conversion of private living quarters, and packed with visual interest. Casks are stillaged away from here, at the pub's rear and, highly unusually, there's no bar servery which, back in the day, didn't deter the patronage of senior staff from Bass's brewery. Joules of Shropshire run the establishment now and their beers together with Draught Bass and guests are offered.

CAMRA has a National Inventory of some 300 pubs with well-preserved interiors which have remained largely untouched over the past fifty years. The Dolphin, Malt Shovel, Royal Oak, Holly Bush and Coopers Tavern all feature, so why not venture out this winter and enjoy a pint or two in a cosy snug?

Allsopp's 200 years of Brewing IPA

An event took place on Friday 11th November at the Constitutional Club in High Street, Burton, to celebrate 200 years since the Brewing of Allsopp's IPA started. The event was organised by Ian Webster in conjunction with the British Guild of Beer Writers.

The actual building of the Constitutional Club was completed in 1878 in a Victorian Gothic style. What a great venue it is: it's awesome! The event started at 1pm with Ian Webster, Burton's own beer aficionado, giving the introductions and procedures and explaining why it's important to mark anniversaries in local history – particularly when you live in the world's most important brewing town.

The first speaker, Jamie Allsopp, seven times great grandson of Samuel Allsopp, told the story of the rise, fall and rebirth of Allsopp's. It all began in 1730 when they were established in Burton and brewing started in 1742. The history behind the famous Red Hand was explained, as was the original Burton IPA brewed by Samuel Allsopp in 1822 that would change Burton for ever: 45 casks of India Pale Ale were exported to Calcutta.

To commemorate the 200 year anniversary, a special celebration IPA has been brewed to the same recipe by Allsopp's head brewer, Jim Appelbee . He took to the stage and said the celebration beer had been based on the original IPA. The original ale had a strong bitterness in order to stand the long journeys across the globe. The current celebration ale is a guite sweet IPA and may mellow with a second conditioning. For this reason three trays of the Allsopp's Celebration IPA 200 were presented to the audience for tasting and scoring. The good response that was evident may well result in the ale being launched in its current form. A cask is at the Coopers and will be frequently turned to condition it.

Everyone present was asked to leave the building to walk about 100 yards down the High Street to the position where the Allsopp's Brewery was located to attach the commemorative plague to the closest brick wall. This is currently the location of Molson Coors HQ and, as they had not been particularly helpful, the plaque will now be situated off their property on a brick wall a few yards away.

Dr. Harry White was the next speaker. Previously he had worked at Bass and then as a director at Molson Coors and latterly Chairman of the Trustees at The National Brewery Heritage Trust. His talk was about the story of IPA and the role of Burton in brewing. It all started in the twelfth century but it was IPA that made Burton on Trent become the brewing capital of the world. This started in

the early 1700s in Burton with the export of ale from Hull to the Baltic. At this time Burton had a population of 4,000 with 35 breweries in the town.

However, by the early 1800s things were changing. Restrictive tariffs were imposed by Russia, and Napoleon was blocking access to Europe. As a result, by 1820 only four breweries were left in Burton. These were Bass, Worthington, Allsopp's and Salts. In the UK domestic market, Burton was losing its competitive edge and breweries from London were taking over. However, the Trent and Mersey Canal soon opened and exports took off again, this time to North America, and India to let soldiers and the growing Empire drink Burton ales. Bass and Allsopp's were the giants of the trade and higher levels of gypsum made the ales crystal clear, bright and gave them greater longevity for the long sea journeys.

Another huge milestone in 1839 was the arrival of the railways to Burton which opened up domestic markets and the ports to export to the world. Brewing in Burton was taking off again with eight breweries by 1834 and twenty by 1900. These breweries produced 3.5 barrels in 1900, of which 50% were by Allsopp's and Bass. By 1876 Bass was the largest ale brewer in the world producing 900,000 barrels, and Allsopp's was not far behind with 750,000 barrels.

The next speaker was Emma Gilleland, Master of Brewing and Director of Brewing at Marston's, who gave us an insight as to why Burton on Trent is the best place for brewing pale ale. It is really down to the water, in which the content of gypsum and calcium sulphate is the highest in the UK. The reason for this is because of the geology of Burton and its aquifers (permeable rocks which can transmit ground water). This explains why wells in Burton are still used by Marston's for their Pedigree ale. The water is still drawn via boreholes accessing multiple aguifers. The water quality from each of the aquifers is different. The reason for this is due to various dissolved salts and ions. To maintain a high degree of uniformity the brewery blends water from different sources.

David Jesudason was next, a writer who, with Zoe Wyeth of Villages Brewery, has created Empire State of Mind, a decolonised IPA which at 6% is brewed with mango, jaggery, lime and Indian spices. Villages Brewery has taken the name from an article in Good Beer Hunting by David. This gives a historical perspective to the story that the East India Company shipping IPA from Britain had extra hops added in order for it to survive the long journey. However, it usually overlooks the racist violence and human cost of Empire. David went on to explain that "desi pubs" (run by British Indian pubs) have taken over many

pubs in Smethwick. Some pubs had been struggling but are thriving now and are described on Birmingham Live as "the pride of the Midlands." Certainly my first tasting of desi ale was very positive!

The final speaker was beer writer and You Tuber, Johnny Garrett, presenting a new, modern British IPA co-created with London's Meantime Brewing Company, Specifically, the future of the world's most popular craft beer style could involve bringing it back closer to its British roots – which took hold in London before flourishing in Burton. The most alarming part of Johnny's presentation was about the crisis affecting UK hops. What are we doing about it? Not much! Just 53 hop farms are left now - only a few months ago it was 57. When farmers shut up shop they are not being replaced and, if and when they are, it takes years for the crop to mature. American hops are taking over, basically due to the current trend in craft beers which have different styles and tastes. The danger is that if styles change again, as they always do, there will be nothing left to go back to and all of our IPAs will lose their characteristic taste.

A general discussion with questions and answers took place with the added benefit of more beer tasting. Those who wanted to carry on in similar terms went to the Coopers Tavern to continue with the delightful Allsopp's Ale and many more.

National Brewery Centre (NBC) Update

Summary: All hopes dashed, the NBC closed on 30th October 2022.

Several years ago, East Staffordshire Borough Council (ESBC) included the Molson Coors (MC) HQ in their plan as a redevelopment area. However at that time Molson Coors stated that they were perfectly happy and had no intention of leaving. That is, not until mid-2022 when they stated they would support ESBC plans for their site and leave to relocate in the main large NBC building. The suspicion was a stitch up between a large multinational and the council. One wonders in whose interest this has been, as both parties were happy! Certainly not the general public! The council leader is said to have stated that he would not have done the deal if he knew that MC were going to move into the NBC building! Evidence (allegedly) has been presented on Facebook that suggests he did know well before the deal was done. One day someone will write a book on this!!

We are now in the situation where the NBC is closed. The designated building (Bass House on High Street) which is to be turned into a museum, and is currently owned by MC, has

to be purchased and redeveloped by ESDC for £5.4m. The government will provide £1.1m from the Towns Fund and ESBC have applied for £20m from the levelling up fund. Will they get this money? Most towns and cities the length and breadth of the UK will have applied for funds as well. At best, it is is possible that they will be successful. At worst, there's a greater chance of a Second Coming! What is plan B? There isn't one!

The big issue is to preserve everything - from the thousands of artefacts to vintage vehicles and even a railway locomotive. The shire horses have been taken to temporary accommodation. The massive Robey engine is at present homeless. All these and many, many more items must be stored correctly, intact and in the right conditions until the new premises are bought and prepared. This could take years and possibly could never happen!

Another factor is, who will run the new premises? How will it be funded? The NBC set itself up as an all-inclusive entertainment centre with the profits going to support the museum. Apart from the museum itself, the NBC had its own taproom bar with six real ale hand pulls, mainly from their own on-site

brewery, and several keg lines. There were two escape rooms, two function rooms, and a large marquee which regularly put on shows from bands to Christmas parties. The Worthington suite also accommodated smaller bands and regular comedy events as well as private parties and other events. A third location was used for weddings and other smaller events. All were generating money for the museum. Where will this come from in the future? What's the plan?

You hardly ever see an MP in a pub hereabout these days, but here we recall some occasions when our elected representatives have been spotted.



Inn Focus: Canal Inn, Bullbridge

The Canal Inn was once owned by Hardy and Hanson (Kimberley) brewery and benefited from being close to Stevenson's huge dye works in Ambergate, which employed 1,400 people in the 1970s. Sadly, however, the demise of the British textile industry led to the closure of the works earlier this century.

In September, Moorwood Hotels reopened the Canal Inn after considerable modernisation and extension, incorporating swish en-suite accommodation. Smart, contemporary décor is the order of the day, but given the rich industrial history of the locality, the name is wisely unaltered.

The Grade 2 listed building was built in 1785 by industrialist, Richard Arkwright, and Cromford Canal references are present in the names of the four beers brewed by Dan Carr of the 14 Locks on-site brewery. Two from Bear Pit, Brickyard, Waterwheel and The Boater's Code always feature here and at sister pubs, The Hurt Arms



in Ambergate, Horse and Jockey in Wessington and the White Hart Inn in Moorwood Moor. You can read about the history behind the names of these beers, and two more real ales from longer established breweries also vie for attention.

I can attest to the quality of the food at the Canal Inn as the home-made steak and mushroom pie was satisfying, and Wednesday is pie and pint night for just £13.50. Food is served from Wednesday to Sunday. In summer, I expect the elevated back patio to be busy with drinkers and diners taking advantage of the sun, and there's a large car park although the Transpeak bus stops at the Hurt Arms, Ambergate, a mile away.


